

**Only 3 Weeks Left to Secure Tickets to N. Shore Series**

With only three short weeks remaining for the sale of season subscriptions to the North Shore Series the committee is looking forward to a highly successful group of concerts. Heading the series of renowned artists who will appear in the auditorium of the Highland Park high school during the coming winter is lovely young Hertha Giatz, contralto star of the Chicago and Salzburg opera companies, who will appear on November 22.

Fritz Kreisler, who recently arrived in this country from Europe, will appear in Highland Park on December 12. Following Kreisler, Donald Dickson, well-known to radio listeners as the star of the Chase and Sanborn hour, will be presented on January 22. North Shore concertgoers are asked to note the change in dates on these first three concerts, a shift made necessary by the European war.

Winding up the Highland Park series will be Argentinita, gifted Spanish dancer, who comes to the High school auditorium on February 14, and Artur Rubinstein, brilliant pianist, whose recitation April 2 will mark the close of the season.

**Rabbi Shulman and Wife to Address Sisterhood, Oct. 16**

Rabbi and Mrs. Charles Shulman will share the platform on Monday, October 16, when the Sisterhood opens its activities for the year. The meeting will be a 12:30 luncheon with Mrs. Milton Grauer, newly elected president of the North Shore Sisterhood, presiding. "Behind the Headlines in Europe" and "Repercussions in Palestine" are the announced subjects. The discussions will be based on actual experiences gained from wide travel in Europe and the Near East. Rabbi Shulman will cover the psychology of the peoples of Poland, Rumania, Turkey and the Balti areas as well as the implications of the association of Germany and Russia in the joint occupation of Central European territory. Also in his discussion will

be a consideration of America's part in the recent conflict. Mr. Shulman will discuss events in Palestine and the Near East insofar as they reflect not only the Jewish refugee problems developing from the horrors occurring in Poland and elsewhere in European war fronts, but also the Arab situation as it is affected by England's entry into the war and the struggle between Italy and England for domination and influence in the Near East.

Mrs. Milton J. Klee, program chairman, has planned this first meeting as a special welcome to the many new members of the Sisterhood.

The meetings of the Sisterhood are open to all who are interested and guests are cordially invited.

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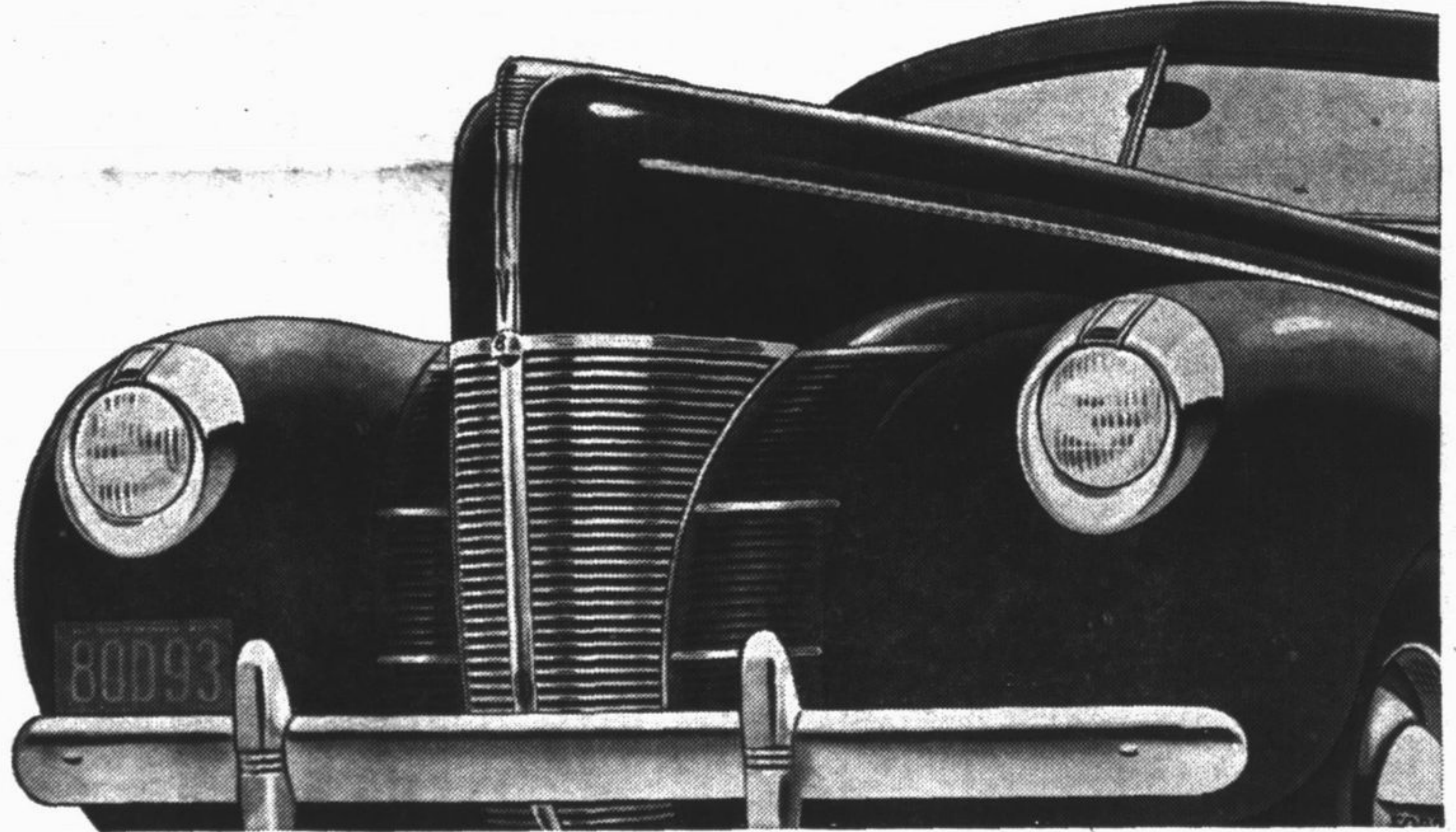
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
