To Add Evanston As Regular Stop in "400" Schedule

Effective Sunday, November 5, Davis Street, Evanston, will be added as a regular daily stop to the schedule of the new streamlined, Diesel-powered "400" of the Chicago and North Western railway, it is announced by F. G. Fitz-Patrick, chief traffic officer. The popularity of the new train with North Shore travelers has brought about this extra stop on the daily run between Chicago and the Twin Cities, St. Paul and Minneapolis.

Northbound, the "400" will stop daily at Davis Street station at 3:12 p.m., leaving Chicago at 3. It will arrive at Milwaukee at 4:15 p.m. and depart at 4:20 p.m.

Southbound, the "400" will make a regular stop at Davis Street at 9:13 p.m. It will leave Milwaukee at 8:10 p.m.

"The popularity of the new streamlined '400' is attested by figures on its first month of service," said Mr. Fitz-Patrick. It was inaugurated on September 24. During the period Sept. 24 to Oct. 23, inclusive, a total of 12,186 passengers in and out of Chicago are reported for the new train. For the same period a year ago the old '400' showed a total of 8,047, an increase by the new train of 4,139, or 51.4 per cent."

Former Highwood Resident Passes on

James E. Brown, 79, of Waukegan, a former resident of Highwood, died Sunday morning at his home at 26 Fulton avenue. He had been ill for only two days.

Mr. Brown was born in California. When he was 8, his parents, the late Patrick and Nancy Brown, brought him to live in West Lake Forest. The elder Browns settled on a farm there. James Brown was reared in West Lake Forest and attended school there.

On October 2, 1884, he married Miss Catherine Cufley of Highland Park. She survives. After their marriage, they went to live in Highwood. While a resident there, Mr. Brown served on the city council and on the board of education.

In 1910, he and his family went to Waukegan. Six years ago, the Browns celebrated their golden wedding.

Surviving besides the widow are six children: Edward Brown, Waukegan, William Brown, Mendota, Mrs. Albert Blaha, Mrs. Frank Scheuer and Mrs. Eric Radke, all of Waukegan, and Mrs. W. E. Felvey of Chicago; 21 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren. A daughter, Mrs. Florence Meade, died 11 years ago, and two sons died in infancy.

Highwood Mayor Vetoes Ordinance on Food Truck Tax

Declaring it was a hardship on local merchants, Mayor Charles Portilia of Highwood, vetoed a recently enacted ordinance assessing a \$25 annual fee on vehicles transporting foodstuffs and beverages to the city.

It is also expected that he will veto another measure if the council attempts to pass a proposed measure to assess Highland Park households \$125 apiece to tap the \$50,000 Western avenue sanitary sewer.

When the sewer was completed last spring, the residents of Highwood were assessed \$200 apiece. Mayor Portilia feels that it is unfair to give the same service to Highland Park residents for less money. Nothing would prohibit a Highland Park resident from allowing other householders in that city from tapping in on his line, after he had paid to tap the sewer, which would leave Highwood "holding the bag" said the Mayor.

The sewer measure, which was introduced by Ald. Joseph Calzia, Third ward, last Friday, will be up for a vote at the next Highwood city council meeting on Nov. 3.

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
