

"Keep Your Red Cross Ready" Adopted As 1940 Drive Slogan

"Keep Your Red Cross Ready" has been adopted as the 1940 slogan of the American Red Cross as it prepares to meet the greatest demands made upon it since World War Days.

Red Cross services to the country include relief to victims of disasters, aid to war veterans and their families, service to members of the nation's armed forces, training in first aid and life saving, accident prevention, various health services and many other activities to alleviate and prevent human suffering.

Every year, more and more calls are made upon the Red Cross to relieve the distress of human beings everywhere. Added to these demands today are appeals to help the suffering women and children of war-torn countries—a service the Red Cross has performed throughout the world for 75 years.

Every contributor to the Highland Park Community Chest becomes a member of the American Red Cross and thus shares in the work of mercy performed by the Red Cross and its Chicago chapter, which includes Highland Park within its jurisdiction.

Disaster service is the best known of the many activities of the American Red Cross. Last year, floods, fires, tornadoes and a dozen other types of calamities struck 157 times, affecting all but five states, and the Red Cross gave rescue, food, clothing, shelter, medical aid and rehabilitation assistance to approximately 130,000 people as a result. Red Cross aid to war veterans and their families was extended to 6,068 families last year. Services included the securing of \$70,000 in veterans' benefits, arrangements for hospital care, personal adjustments and other moves to restore courage, fitness and self-reliance. These home service activities reached all parts of the Chicago area, including Highland Park.

First aid services in the Chicago chapter area continued to expand during the year. Nearly 600 classes were conducted and Red Cross certificates were awarded to 9,531 individuals who are now equipped to render emergency first aid for accident victims pending the arrival of a physician. One course was given in Highland Park, resulting in the award of 36 junior certificates.

The annual home accident prevention campaign resulted in the checking of 475,000 homes for accident hazards. Inspection blanks were distributed in 623 schools through the cooperation of teachers and principals. Three Highland Park schools cooperated, 2,015 blanks having been distributed.

The chapter's life saving service placed special emphasis on water safety in its demonstrations and life saving classes. Training was given to 12,000 life savers and swimmers. Two courses were conducted in Highland Park and 21 junior and senior life savers were certified.

Two courses in home hygiene and care of the sick were conducted in Highland Park during the year, one at the Y.W.C.A. and one at the Highland Park High school. A total of 23 certificates were issued.

Junior Red Cross, with an enrollment of more than 7,500,000 school children throughout the country, has 528,000 members in the Chicago chapter area. Its activities, in which Highland Park schools participate, complement the adult Red Cross activities. They include community improvement projects, making of gifts for the hospitalized, international exchange of correspondence and other efforts to promote health, good citizenship and international friendship.

Five Highland Park schools participated in the Junior Red Cross program last year, with 965 students enrolled. Their activities included life saving courses, home hygiene courses, Christmas activity, including the building of a completely furnished doll house, and tray favors for various holiday events.

The chapter's Gray Lady hospital and recreation service has six enrollees from Highland Park. Certificates are awarded after a period of intensive training and the Gray Lady service is winning increasing acceptance and appreciation by doctors and nurses. Gray Ladies are active in seven Chicago hospitals.

Residents of Highland Park support the Red Cross through their Highland Park Community Chest allocation. Every subscriber of one dollar or more is automatically enrolled as a member of the American Red Cross.

H. F. Kelley is general chairman and disaster relief chairman of the Highland Park Red Cross unit. Lyle Gourley and E. J. Brown are co-chairmen of the life saving committee, and Miss Lulu Leaswell, R.N., and Mrs. Lee C. Gatewood are co-chairmen of the health services committee.
