A PROCLAMATION

By the Mayor and Commissioners Authorizing Highland Park's Fifth Annual Safety Week - Nov. 11-18, 1939

Again, for the fifth consecutive year, citizens of Highland Park are afforded an opportunity to reaffirm their adherence to the constructive program of Safety for our community promulgated by the Citizens' Safety committee.

Now, therefore, as meet and proper recognition of the unselfish efforts of this body in behalf of our collective security, your Mayor and Commissioners, do hereby officially proclaim the week of November 11-18 as Highland Park Safety Week, and bespeak the cooperation of every citizen in a program of activities arranged by the committee and designed to translate the principles of Safety into action fruitful of measurable benefits.

Since any effective drive to achieve Safety demands active support by every element of our community, it is in keeping with our democratic American tradition to afford an opportunity to each individual to participate in the furtherance of this deeply significant and vitally important program.

Your City Council, therefore, approves the committee's recommended design for a safety poster as submitted, and nominates it as Highland Park's officially authorized and copyrighted Safety Week emblem, to serve as each individual's pledge of active support of the Citizens' Safety program.

"Italy" and Art to Feature Lecture by Dr. Watson Nov. 8

Dr. Dudley Crafts Watson will present the second lecture in his series, Wednesday evening, Nov. 8, at the Highland Park Auditorium. He will take his audience to brilliant modern Italy, from Rome to the Alps, and will show this wonderful new Italy and give its foundation in the past.

Dr. Watson's pictures of Venice from dawn to moonrise are paintings by the world's most renowned artists who have found Venice their greatest inspiration. Milan with its La Scala opera leads the way to the Italian lakes and the Alps.

The entire Italian masterpiece exhibit which has been shown at the San Francisco fair will be at the Art Institute in Chicago. The exhibit consisting of 28 objects is valued at \$150,000,000.

Included in this lecture will also be some pictures of the coronation of Pope Pius XII.

On Tuesday, Dec. 5, Dr. Watson will give a thrilling picture lecture of Scandinavia which will include dramatic scenes of the Land of the Midnight Sun. Mexico is scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 6, and on Tuesday, Jan. 16, he will bring you the United States "from Sea to Shining Sea."
