LONG, LONG AGO

Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok, in his little church pamphlet called "St. Paul's Herald" tells of these interesting and old fashioned customs which are recorded in St. Paul's church records:
From the church minutes of 1875: Voted that every farmer bring his own fence post and set it for a hitching post. Voted that a partition be put in the church benches to keep the men and the women apart. Voted that the contract for the building of a church be let to the lowest bidders, including carpenter work, masonry and painting, the last two included materials, for the sum of \$598.25. (The only addition to the church as it was built then is the entrance, basement and back Sunday school room.) In 1894 the present parsonage was built for \$900. One room has been added since.
