He stated that the council is still getting figures on the cost of construction, that the latest figures indicate the cost will be around \$9,-000, and that the council will have to go into a "huddle" to see how the matter can be financed.

Commissioner Sharp reported that the committee on the new incinerator has met and hope within the next few weeks to decide on a location. He also stated that within the next few days he expected that the city would get together with the various taxing bodies and decide about the handling of the delinquent tax situation, but not much actually can be done before the first of the year.

Commissioner Swanson brought up the matter of the frequent destruction and breaking of the street lights and more particularily the lights on the bridges in the city. He reported that the bridge lights have to be replaced nearly every other day because the "kids" find them such excellent targets, and that the only solution, that he can see, would be to have overhanging lights. While the police are constantly watching for the ones who do the breaking, they have had little or no success. Mr. Swanson also requested the placing of two stop signs on St. Johns avenue and Lincoln avenue, because of the danger to the school children crossing at this point, Commissioner Gourley expressed the opinion that the danger is not so great as to warrant the placing of the signs at this point.
