#### A PROCLAMATION

By the Mayor and Commissioners Authorizing Highland Park's Fifth Annual Safety Week — November 11 - 18, 1939

Again, for the fifth consecutive year, citizens of Highland Park are afforded an opportunity to reaffirm their adherence to the constructive program of Safety for our community promulgated by the Citizens' Safety committee.

Now, therefore, as meet and proper recognition of the unselfish efforts of this body in behalf of our collective security, your Mayor and Commissioners, do hereby officially proclaim the week of November 11 - 18 as Highland Park Safety Week, and bespeak the cooperation of every citizen in a program of activities arranged by the committee and designed to translate the principles of Safety into action fruitful of measurable benefits.

Since any effective drive to achieve Safety demands active support by every element of our community, it is in keeping with our democratic American tradition to afford an opportunity to each individual to participate in the furtherance of this deeply significant and vitally important program.

Your City Council, therefore, approves the committee's recommended design for a safety poster as submitted, and nominates it as Highland Park's officially authorized and copyrighted Safety Week emblem, to serve as each individual's pledge of active support of the Citizens' Safety program.

#### Medical Building For Great Lakes

Washington, D. C. (Special)—Bids on construction of a medical building at the Great Lakes naval training station will be called for in December, it was learned at the Navy department today.

The bureau of yards and docks has allotted \$110,000 for construction of the building, plans and specifications for which are nearing completion.

The bureau has asked the Department of Labor to determine a scale of wages for workmen to be employed on the job, and the Labor department has promised to have the scale available by Dec. 1. The wage rates, it was learned, will be partially based on prevailing wage rates in Waukegan and neighboring municipalities.
