City Officers Reports

According to Chief of Police Moroney, in his October Report, the daytime traffic accidents exceed the nighttime accidents by a good percentage. There was 18 accidents during the day as against 10 at night—there were five persons injured in four of the accidents. His report showed that the dogs did not bite as much as in the previous month, for there were but 5 cases of dog bites reported. (Perhaps the fish are biting now—ask the mayor?) Police Magistrate Henry Hansen reported that there were 75 police cases brought before him during the month, of which he dismissed or suspended the fine on 32. This decrease indicates one of two things—either the people around here have become more law abiding or else the Police Magistrate and the Police were not quite so "tough." (What's your guess?)

According to Chief Fire Marshal Hoskins' report, the fire department had a very successful month, for there were no losses on buildings because of fire and only \$175 loss on contents for the entire month. There were 29 fires during the month, of which fifteen were merely grass fires. As a cause, matches and smoking contributed most heavily in number, with a total of fourteen.

Mr. S. D. Morris, the building inspector, in his report for October stated that permits were issued for nine dwellings, three garages and 12 alterations amounting to a total valuation of \$101,575, as compared to a grand total of \$19,540 for October, 1938. The 1939 building valuations to date shows an increase of 31 per cent over a like period for 1938. This should be a welcome report for the taxing bodies.

Mr. George Prindle, in reporting for the water department, showed that he is bent on making 1939 a banner year for the water department. The gain in pumpage for this October was more than eight and one-half million gallons more than last year. The pumpage for the first six months of 1939 amounted to 580 million gallons as compared to 447 million gallons for a like period in 1938.

Mr. Prindle, upon being requested by Commissioner Sharp, also gave an oral report on the carbon machine which was purchased last summer. He stated that thus far the machine has proven quite a success and that extensive additional tests are being run at the present time. He definitely expressed the view that the machine has proven to be a good investment for the city.

**Suburban Train Is on New Schedule**

Suburban train No. 852, operating between Waukegan and Chicago and or Sunday only, has been placed on a new schedule. Effective Nov. 5 it will leave Waukegan at 5:05 p.m. instead of 5:43 p.m. and arrive in Chicago at 6 p.m. Moving up of the departure time enables passengers to make connections in Chicago with the streamliners which depart at 6:15 p.m., the Corn King limited leaving at 6:25 and the Duluth-Superior limited leaving at 6:15 p.m.

And beginning Monday, every youngster will become a volunteer "Safety Scout," checking on all cars that are not cooperating.

The management of the Pearl theater is cooperating by the display of a "trailer" which urges the movie crowds to "show your colors" during Safety Week. Both local newspapers have given unequal support to the movement. "All in all," according to Chairman Earhart, "Highland Park has given a demonstration of civic spirit that is to be commended."

**Poster Contest**

Children in the art classes of the Elm Place and Lincoln schools are participating in a poster contest for cash prizes donated by the Safety committee. The creator of the best safety poster in each school will receive a \$3 prize, the second best \$2 and the third, \$1. The judges are Mayor Frank J. Ronan, Mrs. James Cady Ewell and Mrs. George Allen Mason. If one of the designs is deemed to be of sufficient merit, it will be adopted as next year's Safety emblem and its creator will be awarded a special prize of \$5, as well as honorable mention for creditable work.

"The city council is gratified over the activities of the Citizens' Safety committee," Mayor Ronan said in discussing the unique drive. "Speaking for myself and every city official, we take pleasure in extending an enthusiastic vote of thanks to everyone who helps our city to win the distinction of 'one week without a scratched fender.'"

In issuing a final "Safety Flash" Chairman Edwin L. Gilroy declared: "If our people will pledge themselves to courtesy by displaying our official emblem, we'll make a safety record of which we can all be proud."

**Suicide Verdict Returned in Death of Oren Moorehead**

Oren Moorehead, 42, a W.P.A. foreman at Fort Sheridan, was found dead in his home, 23 Deerfield avenue, early Tuesday morning, a .32 caliber bullet through his head.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict of suicide at an inquest held that afternoon at the H. F. Kelley funeral home on N. Sheridan road.

Two notes written to friends and relatives were found, in which he gave ill health and despondency as the reason for his act.

He was found at 7:30 Tuesday morning by a neighbor, Mrs. Harry Steevers, 222 McDaniels avenue, who stopped at his home as was her custom, to awaken his children and get them ready for school. Moorehead's wife passed away early last summer. He was the father of four young children and there were also three step-sons.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Kelley chapel on N. Sheridan road. Interment will be in Monoyo's cemetery.
