Administration Comments

(Continued from page 1) was tabled for the time being. City Officers Reports .

According to Chief of Police Moroney, in his October Report, the daytime traffic accidents exceed the nightime accidents by a good percentage. There was 18 accidents during the day as against 10 at night-there were five persons injured in four of the accidents. His report showed that the dogs did not bite as much as in the previous month, for there were but 5 cases of dog bites reported. (Perhaps the fish are biting now - ask the mayor?) Police Magistrate Henry Hansen reported that there were 75 police cases brought before him during the month, of which he dismissed or suspended the fine on 32. This decrease indicates one of two things - either the people around here have become more law abiding or else the Police Magistrate and the Police were not quite so "tough." (What's your guess?)

According to Chief Fire Marshal Hoskins' report, the fire department had a very successful month, for there were no losses on buildings because of fire and only \$175 loss on contents for the entire month. There were 29 fires during the month, of which fifteen were merely grass fires. As a cause, matches and smoking contributed most heavily in number, with a total of fourteen.

Mr. S. D. Morris, the building inspector, in his report for October stated that permits were issued for nine dwellings, three garages and 12 alterations amounting to a total valuation of \$101,575, as compared to a grand total of \$19,540 for October, 1938. The 1939 building valuations to date shows an increase of 31 per cent over a like period for 1938. This should be a welcome report for the taxing bodies.

Mr. George Prindle, in reporting for the water department, showed that he is bent on making 1939 a banner year for the water department. The gain in pumpage for this October was more than eight and one-half million gallons more than last year. The pumpage for the first six months of 1939 amounted to 580 million gallons as compared to 447 million gallons for a like period in 1938.

Mr. Prindle, upon being requested by Commissioner Sharp, also gave an oral report on the carbon machine which was purchased last summer. He stated that thus far the machine has proven quite a success and that extensive additional tests are being run at the present ROOM UPPER FLAT, UNFURNISHED time.
