

Lincoln District Students Submit Safety Week Posters

During the past two weeks the students in the art classes in the Lincoln school District No. 108 have entered into competition in drawing posters featuring Safety Week. Approximately 80 posters were drawn and put on display in the art room of Ravinia school. Prizes were offered by the Highland Park Citizens' Safety committee, and a committee selected to judge the posters. Mrs. James Cady Ewell, artist and noted lecturer on art work, was chairman of the committee. She, with Mrs. George Allen Mason and the Honorable Mayor, Frank J. Ronan, made up the committee of three which passed judgment on the posters last Saturday morning.

Mrs. Ewell said, "There was splendid cooperation shown by the schools. Posters made by the children were so good, it was difficult to judge, and all who competed deserve great credit. The main points considered in the judging were: suitability for the theme—"Safety Week"—and simplicity. The committee felt that the requisites of a good poster are a direct statement with adequate lettering that can be easily and quickly read at a distance, and a picture simple and bold enough to carry the message forcefully."

The five prizes awarded by judges were to the following: Patricia Vaaler, Braeside school, first; Erminia Bruno, Lincoln school, second; Dorothy Clarkson, Lincoln school, third; Jane Stroub, Braeside school, fourth; and Marshall Stone, Ridge school, fifth.

Later in the week the Honorable Mayor Frank J. Ronan will give the awards to the students of the winning posters. The poster made by Miss Patricia Vaaler will be used next year as the official poster of the Safety committee. During this week all of the prize-winning posters and those which received honorable mention, will be on display at the Highland Park Public library.
