The Fair will open Monday morning, Nov. 27, and continue all week under the chairmanship of Mrs. David Suttle. The Tuesday evening program is for the father and mother or any children accompanied by parents.

A social hour will follow the program with members of the Book Fair committee, Mesdames George Hart, Burgdorf, Perce, Perreault, and Earl Sproul, as hostesses. The interesting tables exhibiting books for both adults and children will also be features of the evening's entertainment.

Fourteen prizes will be given out during the Tuesday program, including two grand prizes, one for the contestant winning in the final series, and one for the best set of questions submitted. Each grade from the third to the eighth have written questions on books from which Miss Virginia Newcomb, school librarian, has chosen the best set for each room. A team of eight, chosen in preliminary tryouts will represent each grade participating on Tuesday night. That night there will be three contests, one between the third and fourth grade teams, one between the fifth and sixth, one between the seventh and eighth teams. The winner in each of these groups will be the boy or girl who answers the most questions correctly and stays on the stage the longest. These prize-winners will compete in the final tryout for the grand prize. It is hard to guess whether the children being questioned or their parents waiting to hear them give their answers will be the most excited over this novel book program.

Proceeds from Book Fair week go to buy new books for the school library so every school child will get the benefit of the Christmas shopping done at school. Magazine subscriptions and a resale table of adult and children's volumes will also augment the fund. The Fair will be open continuously from 9 to 5 each day.
