A scientist, the son of a minister Carl Pfanstiehl of Highland Park follows pretty much what his father, Albertus A. Pfanstiehl, once said in his writings, "Even a child glows with greater pleasure if he can only construct something than when he indulges in mere destruction."

The patent office announces Pfanstiehl inventions so regularly that people in general take them for granted. More than 120 United States and foreign patents have been issued to him. Mr. Pfanstiehl, engaged entirely in research work since he resigned as president of the Fawcett Metallurgical Corporation of North Chicago, is in his proper element. He acts as consultant on industrial, metallurgical, and physical problems, focuses his attention largely on chemical, metallurgical, and radio development as well as applied physics.

His patents have been on electrical, chemical, and metallurgical processes including the process for manufacturing tungsten and molybdenum for electric contact points and radio-telephone instruments. During the World War he did special research for the war and medical departments of the government. He is also the author of various articles on ignition apparatus, radio theories, and bio-chemical subjects, and a book entitled, "Ignition," published in 1912.

The research engineer was born in Columbia, Mo., and became a student at Armour Institute of Technology, where he was graduated in the class of 1908. The Pfanstiehl Electrical laboratories were founded by him in 1907 to manufacture gas engine ignition coils, X-ray apparatus, and various metallurgical products on the basis of his United States patents. The name of the company changed to Pfanstiehl company, Inc., in 1919 and today is known as the Fawcett Metallurgical corporation. (Many readers will recall the North Chicago plants as the site of strikes headlined in newspapers sometime ago.) A new factory, when the name was changed, was built to make ductile tungsten, metal products, and rare metals such as tantalum and molybdenum.

It was in the next year, 1918, that he began to devote his time to research direction in the Special Chemicals company (now the Pfanstiehl Chemical Company of Waukegan), which he organized to make rare biological chemicals not before manufactured in this country.
