His wife goes marketing, and her purchases are limited by her needs her tastes, her budgets, but not by decree.

He comes home of an evening through streets which are well lighted not dimly in blue.

He reads his newspaper and knows that what it says is not concocted by a bureau, but an honest, untrammeled effort to present the truth.

He has never had a gas mask on.

He has never been in bombproof shelter. His military training, an R.O.T.C. course in college, he took because it excused him from the gym course, and it was not compulsory.

He belongs to such fraternal organizations and clubs as he wishes.

He adheres to a political party to the extent that he desires—the dominant one, if that be his choice, but with the distinct reservation that he may criticize any of its policies with all the vigor which to him seems proper-any other as his convictions dictate, even, if it be his decision, one which holds that the theory of government of the country is wrong undeleted for the first time, ran exand should be scrapped.
