Announce Dividend for Depositors of Closed Highwood Bank

Edward J. Barrett, state auditor, has announced that he has authorized payment of a 9 per cent dividend, amounting to \$14,117.97, to the depositors of the Highwood State bank, Highwood, Illinois. This is the seventh and final dividend to be paid since the bank closed bringing the total paid up to 92 percent. The checks were given out November 22.

In addition to this dividend, \$46,970.75 has been paid on bills payable and \$30,746.11 to preferred creditors.

This payment is from ordinary liquidation.
