Michael F. Gallagher Is Buried Yesterday

Michael Francis Gallagher, prominent lawyer and nationally known librarian, died last Sunday night in his home at 2751 South Deere Park drive. He was 65 years old and had been ill a year.

Mr. Gallagher, a native of Sterling, Ill., was a member of the law firm of Gallagher, Rinaker, Wilkinson & Hall, and a specialist on corporate law. In 1934 he wrote a book called "Government Rules Industry," showing constitutional issues involved under the NRA dictatorship. He was professor on constitutional and corporate law at the John Marshall law school for four years.

Mr. Gallagher was a trustee of the Carnegie Library Foundation, a trustee and former president of the Illinois Library association and the Highland Park library board. A daughter, Mrs. Garrigue Butland, and a son, David Gallagher, a law student at Yale, survive.

Funeral services were held yesterday (Wednesday) morning at Immaculate Conception church. Interment was at Mount Carmel cemetery.
