"Ancient and Modern Necromancy, Alias Mesmerism and Hypnotism, Denounced" was the subject of the Lesson Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, November 26.

The Golden Text was, "When they shall say unto you, Seek unto them that have familiar spirits, and unto wizards that peep, and that mutter: should not a people seek unto their God?" (Isaiah 8:19).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Behold, God is my salvation; I will trust, and not be afraid; for the Lord Jehovah is my strength and my song; he also is become my salvation" (Isaiah 12:2).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Mind is God. The exterminator of error is the great truth that God, good, is the only Mind, and that the supposititious opposite of Infinite Mind—called devil or evil—is not Mind, is not Truth, but error, without intelligence or reality" (p. 469).

### North Shore Finns Plan Celebration of Independence Day

Finnish Independence Day will be celebrated in Highland Park by a benefit gathering of the Lotta Svard, woman's welfare movement in Finland, this Sunday, Dec. 3, at 4 p.m., in the assembly room of the Redeemer Lutheran church on West Central avenue, under the auspices of the North Shore Finnish Lutheran church.

The Rev. W. W. Wilen of Iron Belt, Wis., is chairman of the celebration. A program, partly in the Finnish and partly in the English language, has been worked out, and all interested are invited to this

meeting. A light supper will be served.

The benefit proceeds will be turned over to the Chicago branch of the Lotta Svard to aid that movement in helping war refugees. The movement, named for the country's national heroine who followed her husband into battle in the Finnish war of independence from Russia in 1917, is now caring for thousands of refugees from war-torn nations and for Finnish families from prospective battle grounds.

In view of the tense situation between Russia and Finland this week the meeting on Sunday takes on a special significance.

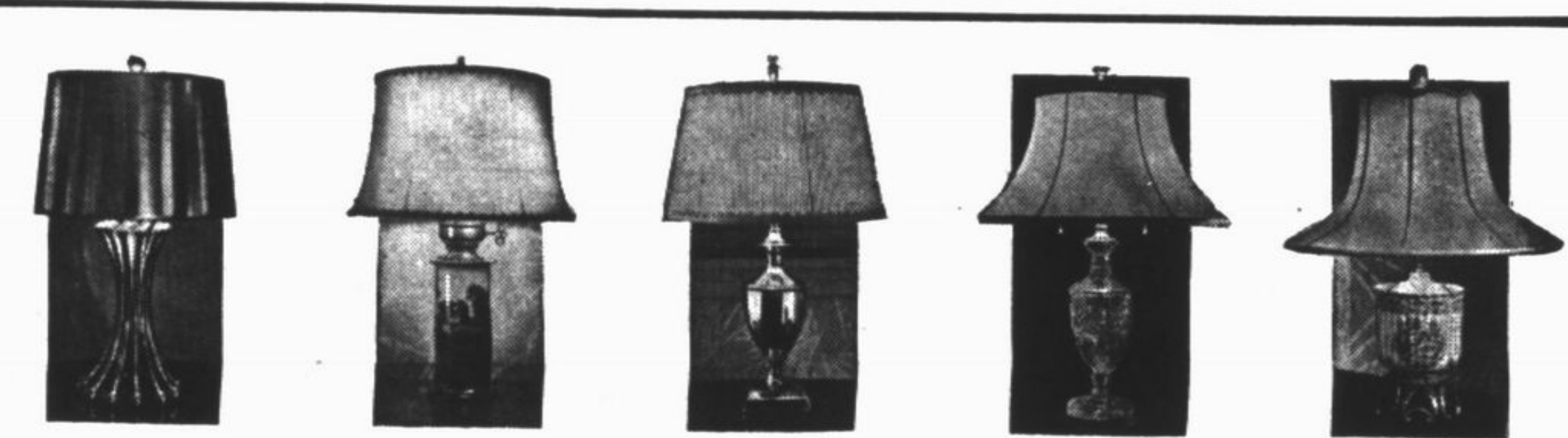
