Attractive placards are being distributed by the local post office to Highland Park concerns desiring same. They have an artistic color design with the wording: Christmas Cards and Parcels. Shop Early, Pack Carefully, Wrap Securely, Write Plainly, Register or Insure Your Gifts. Mail Early for Delivery Before Christmas.

In the lobby of the post office is posted a schedule of Christmas mails, 1939, showing dates parcels should be mailed to all points to secure best handling and arrival not later than Saturday a.m. December 23. This information may also be obtained by calling the post office, H.P. 1367.

The city has done some excellent work lately in widening the street in front of the post office, so as to provide considerably more parking space in that vicinity. Parking room

for approximately twenty more cars adjacent to the post office has thereby been provided, which should go far to relieve parking congestion during the Christmas mailing rush.

Mails are going forward to Europe as usual with the exception of larger parcels to Germany. In this connection it is interesting to note that our local post office reports the shipment to Italy of nearly one thousand pounds of coffee in the last few weeks. Several local firms are equipped to pack and ship same in quantities of one pound and up.

The Highland Park post office will be open all day this coming Saturday for the purchase of stamps, the weighing and dispatch of parcel post packages, registering, purchase of bonds, etc, but the money order window will close as usual at 12:30 p.m. this Saturday. As soon as the need requires, the office will stay open evenings until 8 p.m.
