tioned by the proprietor of one of the local bowling alleys to change the ordinance to permit the legal operation of his establishment on Sundays. Chief of Police Maroney, who was in on the discussion, said that most of the north shore suburbs permitted in varying degree the operation of bowling alleys on the Sabbath. The council as a whole was in favor of revising the city ordinance but were not of one mind as to the length of time the alleys should be allowed to be open. Commissioner Swanson was of the opinion that the council would be laying itself open to criticism by the church going element in the community and by parents of 'teen age children if bowling on Sunday morning or late Sunday evening were permitted. Other members of the council were more inclined to be lenient in fixing any definite schedule for Sunday bowling hours. At the suggestion of Mayor Ronan, the subject was tabled until next meeting. If your reporter is any judge of wind telling straws his guess is that the ordinance will be revised by the council permitting Sunday bowling from something like 12 o'clock noon to 11 p.m.

In making his report, Commissioner Swanson stated that the Ravinia Park trustees hold him that he had no funds available to move the Park's entrance at the corner of Lambert Tree road and Sheridan road back a distance of 30 feet to lessen the danger of automobile collision at this point. Mr. Swanson also reported that the removal of the parkway on Sheridan road, north of the post office had done much to relieve traffic congestion in this area. He also stated that his department had purchased a sand spreader for \$112.50, a sum considerably under the appropriation set for this purpose.

Routine matters such as the approval of vouchers for the month of November and the report of city officers were read and accepted by the council before adjournment.

Following adjournment, representatives of the Omar Baking Company of Milwaukee asked the council to classify its activities of selling bread and allied goods house to house as something other than peddling. It appears that the Omar Baking company has no objection to paying the peddlers license fee, but it does not want its salesmen classed as peddlers. After cross examination by the council, it was ascertained that such classification while carrying a rather mild license fee in Highland Park, is licensed at a much higher rate in other communities. In order to protect local merchants from outside competition, some cities, like Libertyville, license peddlers at a practically prohibitive rate. The council intimated that as far as Highland Park was concerned, the Omar Baking company apparently didn't know when it was well off. With that advice, the subject was closed to further discussion.
