Another gracious ceremony is that of the "Wassail Bowl." In the olden days every village and hamlet possessed a wassail bowl. It 2 Bob Brand was kept by one family throughout the year, and brought out at Christmas time. The bowl was fashioned of wood with a broad base. A lathe was bent over and firmly fastened to form a handle.

When the bowl was to be used, the top of a young holly tree was inserted into a hole in the handle, and the bowl itself was ornamented with STRING BASS - Helen West, Christy ribbons and sprays of holly.

Early in December it was taken to the village pub, filled with hot spiced ale ,and christened by the elders. A selected band of wassailers. gaily caroling the "Wassail Song," carried it to every house and farm from which they thought coins or ale might be forthcoming. When ale was received, the wassailers would drink it down with gusto, toasting the master of the house and all his family.

Then there is the lovely candlelighting ceremony, and the jollity and laughter attendant upon the ancient "Mummers' Play," much pageantry and joyful song.


