65 Year Old Workers Soon Eligible for Old Age Insurance

Shortly before Christmas, 12,175 men and women in Illinois are going to be notified that they may be entitled to monthly old-age insurance checks for the rest of their lives, Albert S. Lewis, manager of the Social Security Board field of-Approximately 300 of this number live in the two counties, Lake and Marks. The amended act. he said, moves the date for monthly benefits up two years to 1940 and makes it possible for a wage earner to qualify after he is 65 years old, even if he has already received a single cash settlement. Under the

original law a qualified worker could obtain only a lump-sum payment equal to 31/2 per cent of his total wages.

"This means," said Mr. Lewis, "that the age barrier to obtaining federal retirement insurance has been torn down. Even the man who was already 65 when the old-age insurance system was set up and who therefore has never been under the federal program may now qualify for monthly benefits. To qualify for retirement insurance in 1940 it will be necessary for him to show that he has worked in six calendar quarters and received in each at least \$50 in wages and has retired."

Lake Disaster Is **Recorded in County** History, 40 Years Ago

Just forty years ago Thanksgiving night, the steamship "Calumet" was grounded off the shores of Fort Sheridan. A. W. Fletcher, one of Highland Park's early settlers and prominent business man, who passed away several years ago, was responsible for the discovery of the distressed steamer and the recovery of its crew.
