Your purchase of Christmas Seals helps the Lake County Tuberculosis association offer tuberculin testing with X-rays for all positive reactors to pupils in the schools in Lake county. Tuberculin tests are given to all children attending the clinics

of the association. A child saved from tuberculosis today may mean the solving of an economic problem of tomorrow.

Over ten thousand of the 15,907 Christmas Seal letters mailed by the association on November 30 are still unanswered. On December 20, \$6,144.38 had been received, \$155.06 more than on December 20, 1938. The association is quite anxious to raise its quota of \$10,000 this year. 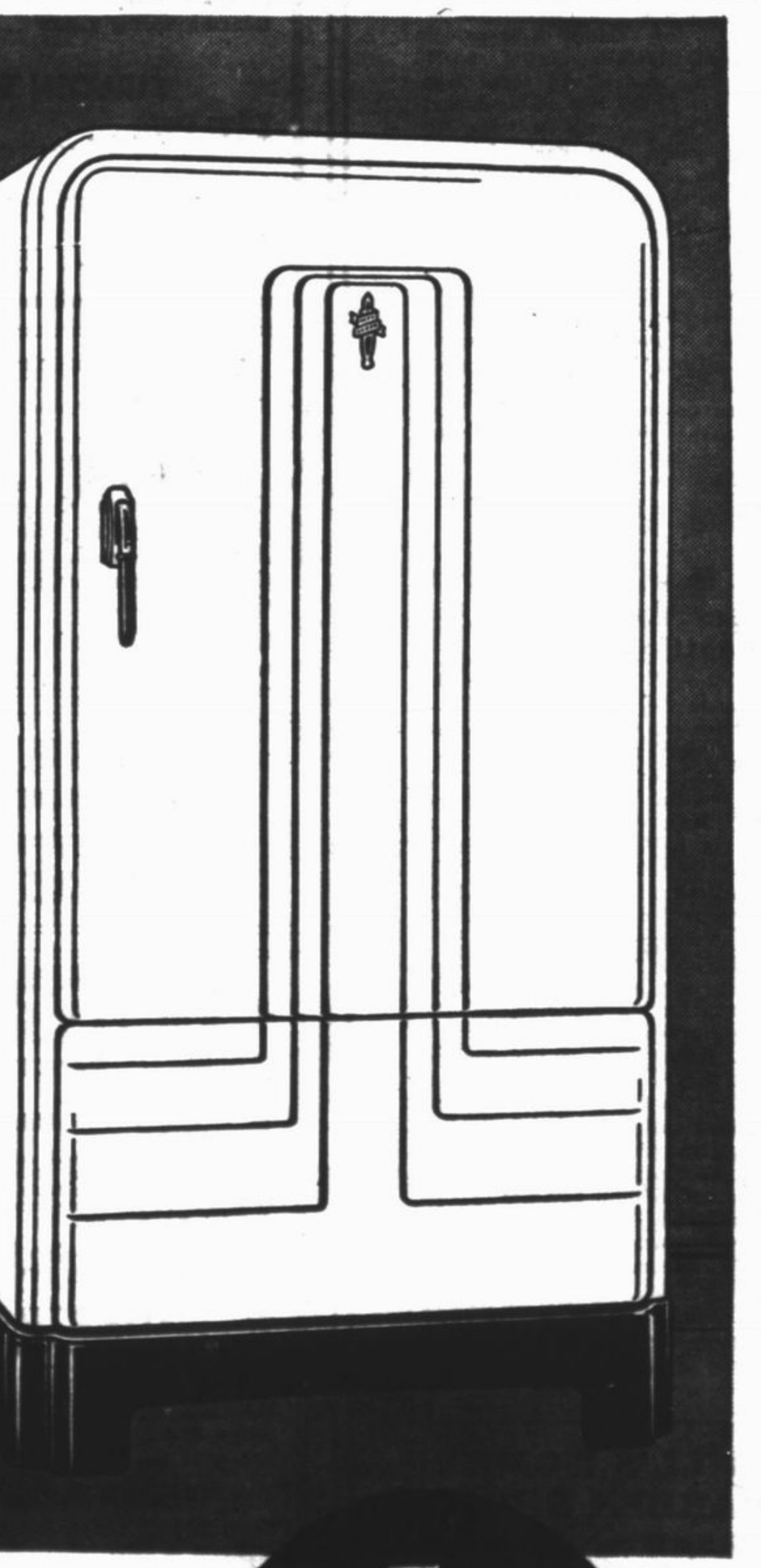
TEN YEARS AGO Dec. 26, 1929
