Braggiotti and Fray

Music lovers of the Lake Forest area are expected to flock to the Waukegan High school gym the night of January 30 to hear Fray and Braggiotti, assisted by Rubinoff and his violin, in public concert. Mario Braggiotti is well known in Lake Forest through his marriage to Mary Melville "Baby" Clow. The concert, which will benefit under-privileged children of Waukegan, is to be held under the joint sponsorship of the Waukegan Exchange club and the American Business club.

Lauded as "the world's most brilliant piano duo," Fray and Braggiotti exhibit a brilliance and versatility in their presentation of selections from their vast repertoire.

They play no music for two pianos, but their own exclusive arrangements from an orchestral score. Their pianos switch with ease and precision from a Bach fugue to a Gershwin rhapsody, and from a Debussy nocturne to a Benny Goodman swinger.

Their programs range from strict interpretations of the classics to "take offs," which they were the first to introduce, in the spirit of clean cut music caricatures of many of the famous writers. Their clever variations in the styles of Stokowski, Sousa and Xavier Cugat, particularly on Home Sweet Home, have won them the plaudits of the nation. They have delighted audiences with their "take-offs" and caricatures of other musicians, of well known orchestras, of people in every day life, the debutante at a ball, the politician on the platform and musical 'portraits' of prominent persons.

Their "take-offs" are not ridicules, but are always presented in the spirit of fun. Braggiotti has said, "After an artist has proved before the world that he is truly an artist, it is legitimate to crack a joke just as a speaker, making a vital address in a political crisis, may sharpen his serious message with a parting quip. We are living in an era where Stokowski is interviewed by Jimmy Durante, Iturbi plays four hands with Bob Burns, Bazooka King, and Paderewski plays the Moonlight Sonata for a couple on a balcony."
