



George Rector Says:
This Ham Steak Is Sure to Please Him

Next time you want to plan a dinner that is intended especially to please the men folk, build it around a thick, juicy certified smoked ham steak! Properly cooked, it is irresistible and you ought to be able to write your own ticket in the way of a new fall hat after the head of the house has been brought to the right stage of mellowness with such a meal.

Select a center cut steak from a certified smoked ham, the kind that requires no soaking or parboiling. If you want, get the whole or half ham—as many housewives do—the butcher will cut the steak for you. The rest of the ham can later be baked at 19 minutes to the pound. The steak should be at least one inch thick. First make a paste of 1/2 cup of dried bread crumbs, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon mustard powder and about 2 tablespoons of cold water. Spread this paste over the top of the ham.

Place the ham steak in a baking dish and carefully pour over and around it 1 cup of canned apple juice. Be sure that you get this year's pack of the apple juice—the flavor is so fresh and delicious! Take care also in pouring it over the steak not to disturb the bread-crumbs paste. Bake the steak in a moderate oven (350°F) for 1 hour, basting frequently and adding more apple juice as required. Sprinkle with minced parsley and serve on a garnished platter.

If you want to make full use of the oven, you might bake some potatoes and acorn squash at the same time, as vegetables to accompany the steak. An excellent salad to go with this meal is quickly made by combining one cup of grated raw carrots, one half cup crushed pineapple, drained, and about 2 dozen sultana raisins with enough mayonnaise to give the salad the right consistency. Salt to taste. Pile on lettuce leaves and sprinkle with a dash of paprika. This will serve four.
