
#### Deerfield Man Hurt When Car Upsets After Skid on Ice

A surprise for the family, or treat for your guests, it's handsome enough for a holiday party, with that garnish in the traditional holiday colors—the red of radish roses and the green of crisp, sestful watercress. Good to look at, delicious to eat, the tested recipe follows: Round Steak with Mushroom

Stuffing

11/2 lbs. round steak, 3 theps, butter cup bread crumbs 14 teasp, thyme and 1 8-oz, can sliced or

jelly roll and fasten with skewers. Season meat with salt and pepper, dust with flour. Brown in hot fat in roasting pan, or in oven glass baking dish. Add water to cover bottom of dish and roast, covered, in moderate oven (350° F.) until meat is tender-1 to 11/2 hours.

Note: Flank steak, scored and larded, may be used instead of round steak if desired. Or broil and serve with: Mushroom Steak Sauce

Brown % cup canned sliced mushrooms, drained from liquid, in 2 tablespoons butter. Add 1/2 cup chili sauce, dash of cayenne, juice of half lemon and heat through. Thin to desired consistency with canned mushroom liquid and, continue cooking until heated through again.
