Leonard North Is Elected President of Meat Cutters Union

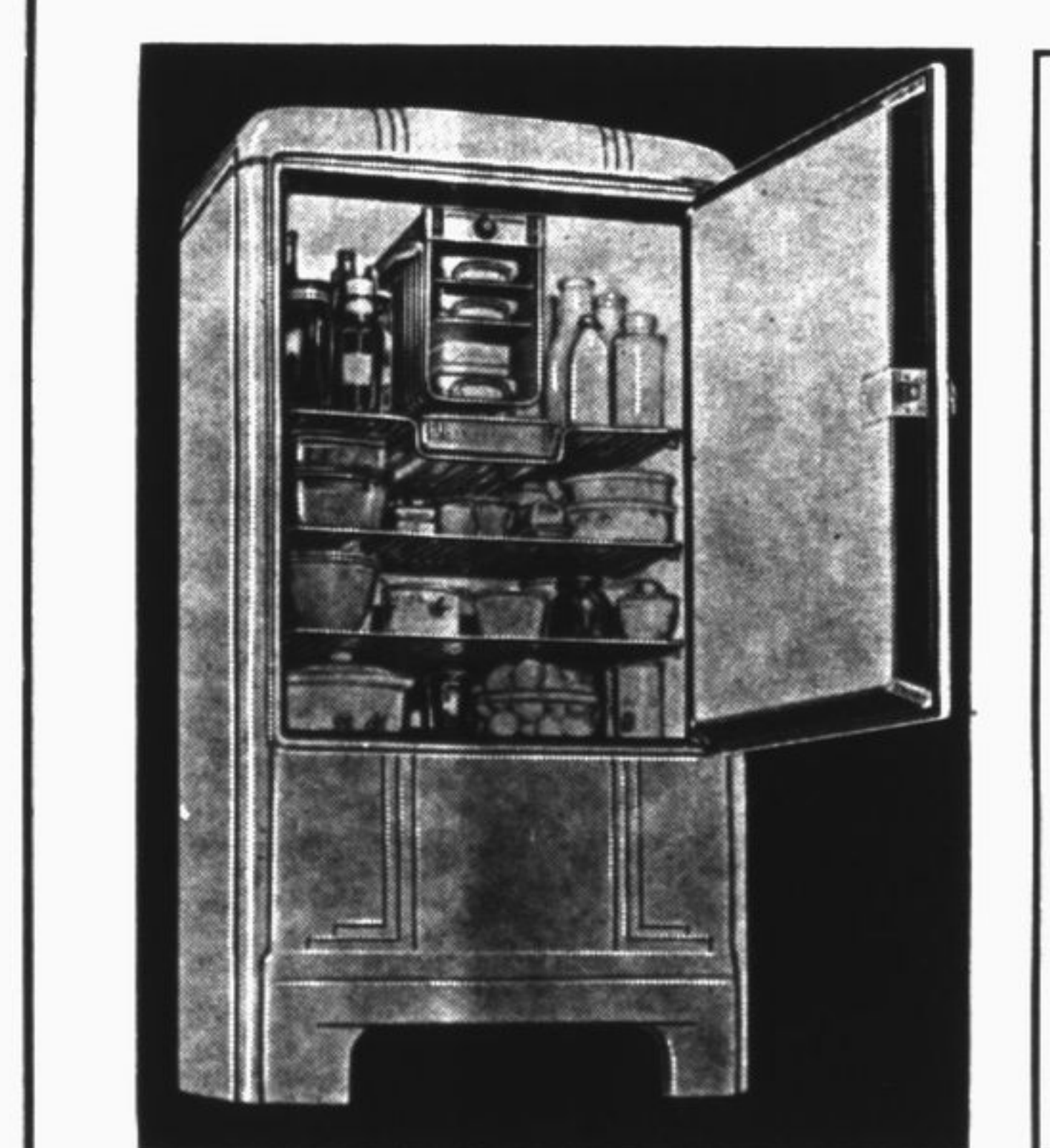
Meat Cutters Union, Local 262, who have been serving Mrs. Housewife for the past year in the territory from Wilmette north to the State line and west to Milwaukee Avenue, held their election of officers January 9. The following were elected:

Leonard North, president; David Williams, vice president; Howard Randall, recording secretary; Harold Ross, financial secretary-treasurer (3 years); Bernhard Ebbing, guide; O. D. Meredith guard; Mert Pennick, sergeant-at-arms. Trustees—Nick Redding (3 years); Ben Ripple (2 years); Herman Woertz (1 year).

These men are all meat cutters and work on the North Shore and their aim is shorter hours and fair wages. Approximately 250 memberships during the year of 1939 paid out \$338 for sick benefits and \$100 for death benefits. Every meat market open after 6 p.m. on week days and 7:30 p.m. on Saturdays or 7 p.m. in District No. 1, is branded as unfair to the meat cutters by making it harder for them to receive shorter hours. The meat cutters at this time are working 56 hours a week which is quite a bit more than the average tradesman is working.
