These men are all meat cutters and work on the North Shore and their aim is shorter hours and fair wages. Approximately 250 memberships during the year of 1939 paid out \$338 for sick benefits and \$100 for death benefits.

Every meat market open after 6 p.m. on week days and 7:30 p.m. on Saturdays or 7 p.m. in District No. 1, is branded as unfair to the meat cutters by making it harder for them to receive shorter hours. The meat cutters at this time are working 56 hours a week which is quite a bit more than the average trades-

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
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
