Deerfield Auxiliary to Sponsor Annual Americanism Program

Deerfield unit No. 728, American Legion Auxiliary, this week launched its annual Americanism program for upper grade children in the four local schools, Bannockburn, Holy Cross, Wilmot, and Deerfield elementary schools.

A speakers' program covering the following seven weeks has been arranged in an effort to give the children an understanding of the American form of government and special instruction on local governmental units. Interested adults are invited to attend these sessions, which are scheduled as follows:

Thursday, Jan. 25, 9 o'clock—Attorney Erwin Seago, "A Government that is a Republic."

Thursday, Feb. 1—Town Clerk Irene A. Rockenbach, "History of West Deerfield Township."

Thursday, Feb. 8—Assessor Edw. H. Selig, "Taxes."

Thursday, Feb. 15—Circuit Clerk Lyman J. Wilmot, "The Government of Lake County."

Tuesday, Feb. 20—Superintendent of Schools W. C. Petty, "The Schools of Lake County."

Thursday, Feb. 29—E. R. Seese,

"Our High School." Thursday, March 7—County Judge Perry L. Persons, "Good Citizenship."

At the conclusion of the speakers' program, the unit, with the cooperation of village officials, hopes to explain village government in detail, and allow eighth grade pupils to "take over the town" for a day.

Deerfield Post No. 738 and its Auxiliary Unit have announced plans for the annual oratorical contest for eighth graders. This year the students will be given their own choice from a list of seven topics, and the orations will again be presented at a public program early in March. Sixth and seventh grade pupils will participate in an essay contest on the same subjects, awards to be presented at the oratorical program.

Deerfield's Unit's Americanism program also includes sponsorship of a speaker in the Highland Park high school, in cooperation with the Highland Park Auxiliary Unit and D. A. R. chapter.
