Mrs. Raymond S. Simons, of the Highland Park League of Women Voters and State Publicity chairman, is one of a group of five league women from Illinois who have written and are presenting the material for a study of political parties, called "Political Parties—Their Organization and Influence."

"We feel there is so much criticism of political parties," says Mrs. Simons, "without enough information to base that criticism on. Women interested in seeing changes made in the system, must first thoroughly acquaint themselves with the forces that influence political parties."

Since 1940 brings an exciting and gripping presidential election with the political parties going full steam ahead, the board of directors of the Illinois League of Women Voters believe it is an opportunity par excellence to stress the influence of the parties and to urge participation in those activities.

"We cannot be satisfied with mere destructive criticism," says Mrs. W. W. Ramsay of Chicago, head of the committee, "nor tolerant of the evils which have crept into the party system. We should endeavor to so improve them, that they will prove a vehicle for carrying out the popular will, rather than the will of an entrenched group. The individuals who control the party machine in any community, represent the best or worst element in that community, according to the interest in, or apathy toward, public affairs by the people as a whole."
