What promises to be a departure in the concert field will be the concert presentation of modern music as given by Rubino and his associate artists, Fray and Braggiotti, when they appear at the Waukegan high school gym on January 30 at 8:30 p.m. under the auspices of the Exchange club and American Business club of Waukegan.

These nationally famous artists will present for the first time here a number of unusually arranged selections which are designed to include in the shortest possible time concentrated entertainment values.

As a contrast to the long drawn out selections generally presented on the concert platform, Rubino and Fray and Braggiotti have selected for their program a series of short numbers, varied in appeal but still possessing all the tonal vigor and color of the greatest compositions.

Rubino enjoys a place all his own in musical America. Steering a middle course between popular music and the classics, he has won the masses to an appreciation of violin

and orchestral music. He has genius for original arrangement. On the one hand, he has lifted popular music to heretofore unknown levels of beauty and artistic expression. On the other hand, he has recreated appeal of the classics by interpreting their subtle harmonies in the idiom and tempo of modern living.

Fray and Braggiotti are recognized as being one of the world's most brilliant and versatile piano teams who can fascinate young and old alike, from every walk of life. Their original interpolations are gems.

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Eternity, not time, expresses the thought of Life, and time is no part of eternity. One ceases in proportion as the other is recognized. Time is infinite; eternity is forever infinite. Life is neither in nor of matter. What is termed matter is unknown to Spirit, which includes in itself all substance and is Life eternal" (p. 468-9).
