## Local Women Will Speak on Aid to Dependent Children

Mrs. Raymond S. Simons, of the Highland Park League of Women Voters, and member of the state board, will address League members in Galesburg, Rock Island, DeKalb, Freeport and Rockford. Mrs. Maurice A. Pollock, also Highland Park and state board member, is another of a small committee which plans to visit and address local Leagues during the next two weeks, discussing the possibility of procuring a more adequate system of aid to dependent children.  
Acuteness of the relief situation, the League believes, points up more than ever, the desirability of taking advantage of federal funds, available under the Social Security Act,

to safeguard the interests of dependent children.

Illinois now pays taxes to support systems of aid to dependent children in 40 states—but is ineligible to receive its share of federal funds because its present mothers' pension system fails to meet the standards set by the Social Security Act.


