### Charles J. Sack, Pioneer Resident, Passes On Friday

Charles J. Sack, one of the pioneer residents of this vicinity, passed away Friday at his home on N. St. Johns avenue. He was 88 years old.

Mr. Sack was born in Deerfield January 1st, 1852, the son of Bartel and Anna Sack. When thirty years of age he moved to Highland Park where he spent the remainder of his life.

He was married to Miss Emma Fry of Northfield January 26, 1875, and it was on the 65th anniversary of his marriage to her that he passed away. His wife preceded him in death February 10, 1921.

There were six children born to this union, Mrs. Laura Ernst, Mrs. Dimple Larson, Mrs. Delia Shebsta, Mrs. Velda Kutzer, Orville and Frank Sack, the latter passing on July 12, 1921.

In 1923 Mr. Sack married Mrs. Nellie Johnson.

In addition to his wife and three children, Mr. Sack is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Lizzie Schinliober of North Northfield, Mrs. Mary Selig of Alpa, Iowa, and Mrs. Anna Kuhn of Highland Park. There are 17 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren, besides other relatives and a host of friends.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Kelley's chapel. Rev. H. F. Siemsen of Bethany church officiated. Interment was in North Shore Garden of Memories.

### Argentinita Will Appear on Fourth Of Season's Series

Presenting a unique and colorful program of Spanish and Latin American dances, Argentinita and her noted company of dancers will appear in the auditorium of the Highland Park High School on Monday, February 12. The fourth feature in the season's North Shore Series, Argentinita's recital promises an unusual evening of entertainment, with a glorious combination of fascinating costumes, gay Spanish music, and remarkable dance routines.

Argentinita's Highland Park appearance will mark her debut before a North Shore audience, for this is only the second American tour which this gifted artist whom "Time" has called "Spain's No. 1 dancer" has made. North Shore dance-lovers who saw the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, however, will undoubtedly remember Argentinita's brilliant choreography for "Capriccio Espagnol."

Unwilling to distort the material of her art and indulge in forced effects, Argentinita, in the words of one critic, "relies upon a strong feeling for the nature of her medium and allows the idiom to speak for itself." Her dancing, in consequence, is distinctly feminine, with that touch of irony and subtle sense of comedy characteristic of the best Spanish dancing. Controlled by a well-defined tradition, "she stresses," according to another critic, "those much neglected aspects, the dignity and tradition of an art that is far older than ballet."

Of peasant stock, Argentinita is able to present with complete understanding the native dances of almost every one of the 47 Spanish provinces, as well as of Latin American countries. Such variety is unusual among Spanish dancers, who ordinarily concentrate on those few dances in which they can easily excel. Argentinita, on the contrary, in the course of a single program, will become in turn a high-caste Castilian lady, a Jerez gypsy or even a Peruvian Indian, appearing with Pilar Lopez and Antonio Triano in a notable succession of colorful costumes of great historic and intrinsic value.

### Four Hurt as Car Runs Into Train at County Line

Last Wednesday evening a Northbrook motorist beat a North Western train to the County Line road crossing, but received only a tie with a paralleling northbound Skokie Valley freight train.

Four persons, including Edward Wagner, 42, of 2110 Walters avenue, Northbrook, the driver, were injured in the collision and removed to the Highland Park hospital.

Wagner's wife, Myrtle, 41, was the most seriously hurt, suffering a forehead cut, a back injury and a possible skull fracture. James C. Rogers, 19, her son by a previous marriage, was lacerated about the face. Wagner received face and neck cuts, while Warren Klug, 19, of 206 Walters avenue, was shaken up.

The auto was dragged 75 feet north of the Skokie Valley crossing, which is east of the North Western one. Wagner denied any attempt to beat the steam train, declaring that he had stopped for the first train and failed to see the second.
