### Northwestern Offers Special Week-end Trip To Skiing Country

A special Lincoln's Birthday Week-end snow train trip to Ironwood, Michigan, the heart of the great iron country, where snows are three feet deep and women go shopping on skis, is announced by the Chicago & North Western railway. Special rates for either a two-day or three-day trip have been prepared, the train leaving Chicago Friday evening, Feb. 9 at 6 o'clock. Return to Chicago may be made either Monday or Tuesday morning following.

Specially chartered Pullman cars will be provided for this trip, with stops to be made en route north at Evanston, Winnetka, Highland Park, Lake Forest, Milwaukee and points north. The mecca of the skiers and winter sports fans, who are already signing up fast for this trip, will be the famous Mt. Zion, which with its surrounding satellites of hills will offer thrills galore for the expert and amateur skier. On the slopes of Mt. Zion one of the finest ski towns in the country, 1,600 feet long, is in operation and rises to a height of 300 feet.

Facilities for cross country skiing, tobogganing and skating are also available for the snow train fans. A new shelter house on Mt. Zion affords resting and refreshment quarters.

The train will reach Ironwood at 7:25 a.m. on the morning of February 10. For those desiring the two-day stay the train leaves Ironwood at 6:30 p.m., Sunday, Feb. 11 and for those on the three-day trip the train leaves Ironwood on Monday, Feb. 12 at the same hour.

Taxis will be waiting at the Ironwood station to take the fans to the hotel where they will make their rendezvous. Here they change into ski togs and are whisked out to Mt. Zion.

Reservations for the special Ironwood trip will be accepted up to 12 o'clock noon, Thursday, Feb. 8.
