

Henry J. Fisher Killed on Trip to Wisconsin Friday

Henry J. Fisher, 54, of S. Green Bay road, was killed Friday evening in West Bend, Wis., when he was seeking aid, after his car was stalled along the highway.

Fisher was returning to home, when a truck passed his car forcing him to the side of the road, his car becoming wedged in the snow. While waiting for a tow truck to come to his assistance, he walked along the highway. Two trucks passed one another, and it is believed that Fisher failed to see one of the trucks and was struck by it. He was killed instantly.

Fisher has resided in Highland Park nearly all his life, having been born in what is known as Northfield, and coming her when a small child.

Besides his wife, Florence, he leaves his mother Mrs. Fred Fisher, three sisters, Mrs. James Hesler, Mrs. Charles Rudolph and Mrs. Edward Berkert and two brothers John, and Fred to survive.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Kelley's chapel with interment in Memorial Park cemetery.

Waukegan Girl Is Killed in Collision On Skokie, Tuesday

Miss Alice Jonaitis, 21 years old, of 725 Jackson street, Waukegan, a factory employe, was killed early Tuesday and another girl and two soldiers from Fort Sheridan were injured in a collision on Skokie highway near Highland Park.

The car, driven by Alice's cousin, Miss Lucille Jonaitis, 17, of 1111 Victoria street, North Chicago, skidded and collided with a truck driven by Charles Vilhauer, 40, of Batavia, Wis.

Lucille was taken to Highland Park hospital with a fracture of the hip and leg. Privates Andrew Dovich, 19, of Huddy, Ky., and Edward Wanderski, 21, of 3247 North Whipple street, of the 61st coast artillery (antiaircraft), were taken to Fort Sheridan hospital.

The inquest was postponed to a later date pending recovery of the three others injured. Vilhauer was released on bond.

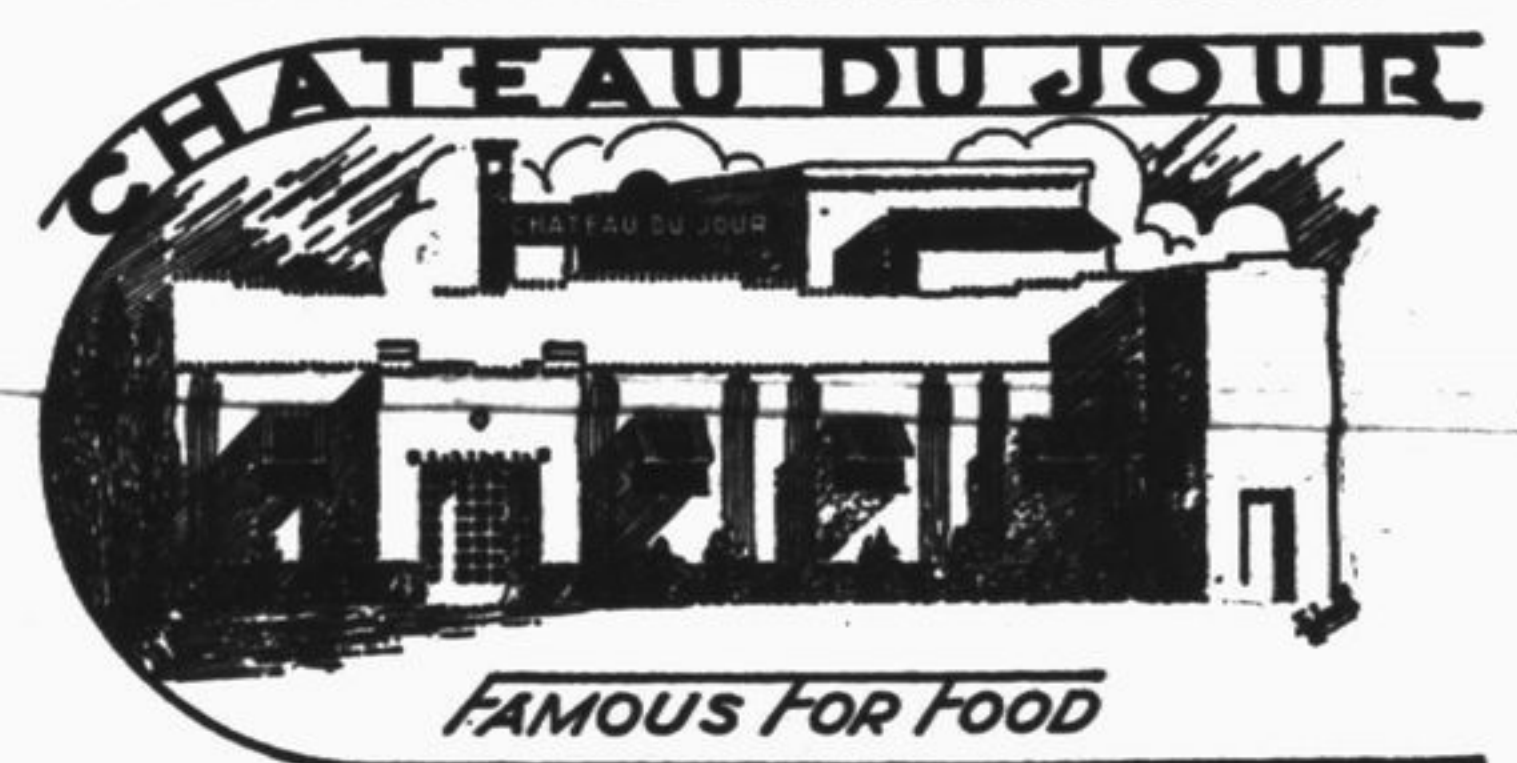

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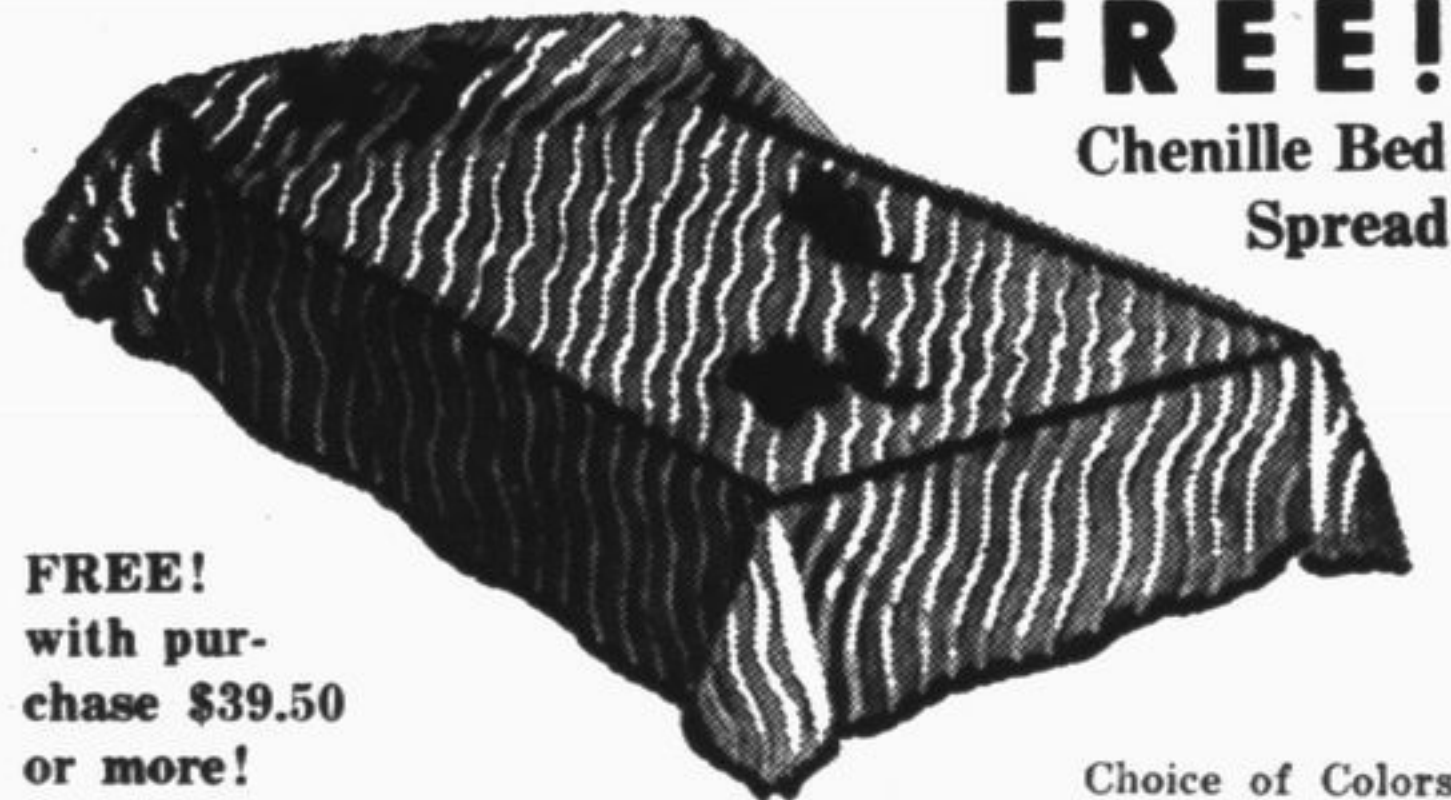
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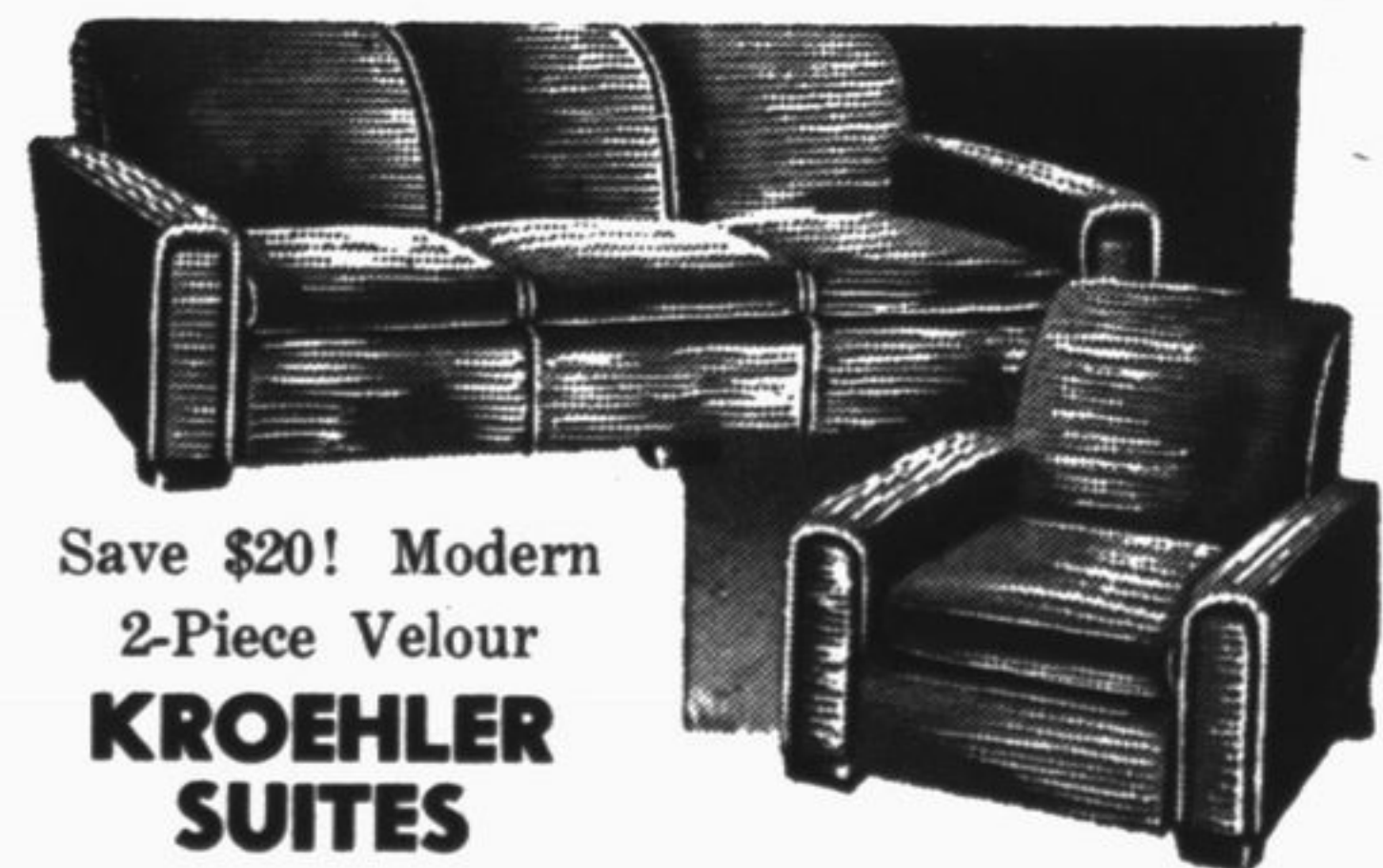
