Candy Leads In Lenten "Taboo" List

Candy leads the "taboo" list during Lent, according to results of a survey just completed in New York and Chicago by the John R. Thompson Company.

Some 32.2% of those questioned will put candy on their banned list, in spite of the fact that candy manufacturers show an increase in business because of Valentine Day sales. Next on the list of Lenten restrictions is liquor and tobacco which will be blacklisted by 24.1% and 18.3% respectively, during the six week period of self-denial.

The questionnaire shows that 7.1% of those observing the Lenten restriction will give up meat, while another 5.3% will abstain from ice cream, cake, pie and other desserts.

About 5% have signified their intention of staying home from the movies from Ash Wednesday until Easter Day, March 24, while another three per cent will observe miscellaneous sacrifices at the table, during that period.

The Thompson survey is based on a representative cross section of approximately 1,500,000 Catholics and 31,500 Episcopalians in Chicago, and 1,000,000 Catholics and 150,000 Episcopalians in New York City.

The survey does not include the many members of other denominations who will observe some form of self-denial during the Lenten period.

The purpose of the Thompson questionnaire was to enable restaurateurs throughout the country to determine what particular foods would best meet the desires of their customers during Lent.
