"Keep Electricity A Good Servant" Says Miss Ibsen

"Electricity may be the cause but it is seldom the sinner in the case of many a victim that comes to us for repairs," said Miss Marjorie Ibsen, superintendent of the Highland Park hospital. "Electricity like fire, you know, is a wonderful servant but a terrible master. And when someone is badly burned or shocked, nine times out of ten it is the victim's fault. He has misused electricity."

Men, women, and children are tragically careless in handling what has come to be man's greatest servant. To wipe out this carelessness or ignorance about electricity, especially in the home, these simple rules have been made:

1. Don't buy things electrical on a basis of how cheap, but how good. Many cheap electrical devices are dangerous when connected and in use.
2. Don't be a "screw-driver electrician." Have all repairs to wiring or appliances, or new equipment installed, only by a competent electrician.
3. Remember that a fuse is a safety valve. Never use a substitute for a fuse. If it must be replaced, use only another fuse of correct size.
4. There is something wrong with

wiring or appliances or equipment, if a fuse blows frequently. Telephone your utility company for help. Don't guess.

5. Overloaded or over-fused circuits result in many fires and burns. Before you use a multiple-socket device be sure the circuit can carry the load.

6. Never touch sockets, wall outlets, switches, cords or appliances with wet hands or if you are standing in water.

7. In basements or laundries use cords with waterproof coverings.

8. When cords become frayed, replace them with new ones without delay. Never jerk cords from equipment or outlets. Release the cord by pulling on the plug itself. Do not leave loose cords connected with outlets.

9. When working in kitchen or bathroom be careful not to touch a switch with one hand and a water faucet with the other. If you do, severe shock or burn may result.

10. Never let children tinker with electrical wiring or appliances.
