Invite Students to Compete in Fine Arts Contest

High school students of all communities are invited to compete in the fine arts contests sponsored by Frances Shimer college for women at Mount Carroll, Ill. Competitions will be held during the spring

months in the fields of piano, voice, violin, and cello, speech and dramatic reading, poetry, short story, and essay writing. Winners in the separate fields will be awarded a scholarship of \$200-\$400 at Frances Shimer. This is the sixth annual series of fine arts competitions sponsored by the college.

High school juniors and seniors may compete by writing the committee on scholarships, in care of the college, stating which competition they wish to enter. Tryouts in all fields will be held by Shimer faculty members in Chicago on Saturday, April 20, and Saturday, May 4. A third and final competition will be held at the college on Saturday, May 18.

Frances Shimer college has liberally encouraged fine arts work ever since its founding in 1863. Although it is a liberal arts college, it has always had strong fine arts departments. The college therefore offers scholarships in the fine arts through annual competitions, opening them to all junior and senior high school girls who "are able to do successful scholastic work, as determined by their previous high school work," according to Albin C. Bro, president of Frances Shimer.

Funeral Services For C. C. H. Suhr Are Held in Chicago

C. C. H. Suhr, a resident of Highland Park for the last sixteen years, passed away on Saturday, Feb. 24, at Pontiac, Michigan. His body was sent to Highland Park, where funeral services at the local Lutheran church took place on Tuesday afternoon, with burial in St. Lucas cemetery in Chicago.

Mr. Suhr was a retired Lutheran parochial school teacher. He received his education at the Concordia Teachers college at Addison, Ill. Graduating in the year 1877, he entered his profession at the age of twenty. In his long career as a teacher he taught at only two schools. First he served St. John's Lutheran church at Racine, Wis., for a period of 12 years. Then in 1890 he accepted a call to Immanuel Lutheran church of Chicago, where he was privileged to teach for 35 consecutive years. In his profession he was held in high regard, and there are thousands of his former pupils who hold him in loving memory.

At the age of 67 he retired from office, having served a total of 47 years. After his retirement he made his legal residence with his son, the Rev. W. F. Suhr, pastor of the local Lutheran church. He spent much time with his daughter, Mrs. Wm. Faber of Pontiac, Mich., where he passed away last Saturday. He is survived by two other sons, Mr. Carl Suhr of Evanston and Mr. Vincent Suhr of Wilmette. His wife preceded him in death forty years ago.
