Daniel S. Hunt Republican Nominee State Representative

Daniel S. Hunt, candidate for Republican nomination for Representative in the General Assembly from the Eighth Senatorial District of Illinois.

Mr. Hunt is 45 years of age and resides with his wife and four sons at 1055 Fair Oaks avenue, Deerfield, Ill. He is a World War Veteran, having served overseas with the 45th Regiment, Coast Artillery Corps, A.E.F.

His whole life has been identified with newspaper work in all its branches. For all of 26 years he has been identified with his father and is now vice-president of Fred R. Hunt & Sons, Inc., publishers of the Chicago Leader of Rogers Park.

Mr. Hunt has been affiliated with other neighborhood newspapers during recent years. For ten years he has been editor-publisher of the Lake County Legionnaire, and as a journeyman linotype operator he has been working consecutively for the following publications: The Highland Park Press of Highland Park, Ill., the Lake Forester of Lake Forest, Ill., and in the past two years has been working in the same capacity with the Chicago Daily News.

Receiving his journeyman's card in 1917 from the International Typographical Union, Mr. Hunt is still an active member of that very fine and long-time organization.

Mr. Hunt has always taken an active interest in public affairs and

is a close student of activities having to do with general public welfare.

As present Police Magistrate of the Village of Deerfield he has shown independence and courage as well as fairness to the general public in the performance of his judicial duties. He is radically opposed to all unfair speed trap tactics and other discreditable efforts of police authorities and traffic officials to capitalize their work in

swelling community revenues and fattening the costs which the judge is usually primarily interested in.

For four years Mr. Hunt was vice-president and director of the Deerfield Building and Loan association. He is an active Mason and past officer of the Highland Park chapter of Royal Arch Masons; past president of the Men's Club of St. Paul's Church of Deerfield, past chef de Gare of the 40 & 8 and has held numerous other official posi-

tions in the American Legion. He enlisted when he was 22 years of age and served overseas and in this country until his honorable discharge in March, 1919.
