able to be present at Monday evening's meeting. Also in attendance and taking part in the presentation of the petition to the members of the coucil was Mrs. Sigurd Johnson. president of the Highland Park League of Women Voters.

In her remarks to the council Mrs. Ringer pointed out that in the State of Illinois cities of over 5,000 population cannot adopt the City Manager form of government without authorization by the General Assembly. To date, she stated, the league had been to a large extent unsuccessful in inducing the Illinois General Assembly to take suitable action on this question. The league has supported enabling legislation D53tf in the past several sessions of the assembly which would permit communities to adopt the City Manager form of government. However, the bills have never been acted upon favorably. All the league asks, Mrs. Ringer stated, is that the legislature give the citizens of Illinois the right to vote on the question whether or not they wish to have this form of local government.

> As a prelude to action by the legislature, a Public Policy Referendum has been proposed. This referendum is an advisory vote expressing the opinion of the voters on a topic. Of itself, it has no legal status and is simply an expression of the "will of the people." The requirements of a Public Policy Referendum include obtaining signatures of ten percent of the registered voters of the state. This petition which in Illinois must include approximately 450,000 signatures must be filed with the secretary of state with the question as it is to appear on the ballot. If the qualifications are met, the current plan is to hold the referendum at the general elec-

tion in November. For the uninitiated, the City Manager plan in brief is this. It permits the voters to elect a small council on a non-partisan ballot from the community at large. The council determines the policies and appoints a city manager who carries out the council's program. The council may, upon cause,
