Colored Woman Has Two Legs Broken In Crash Thursday

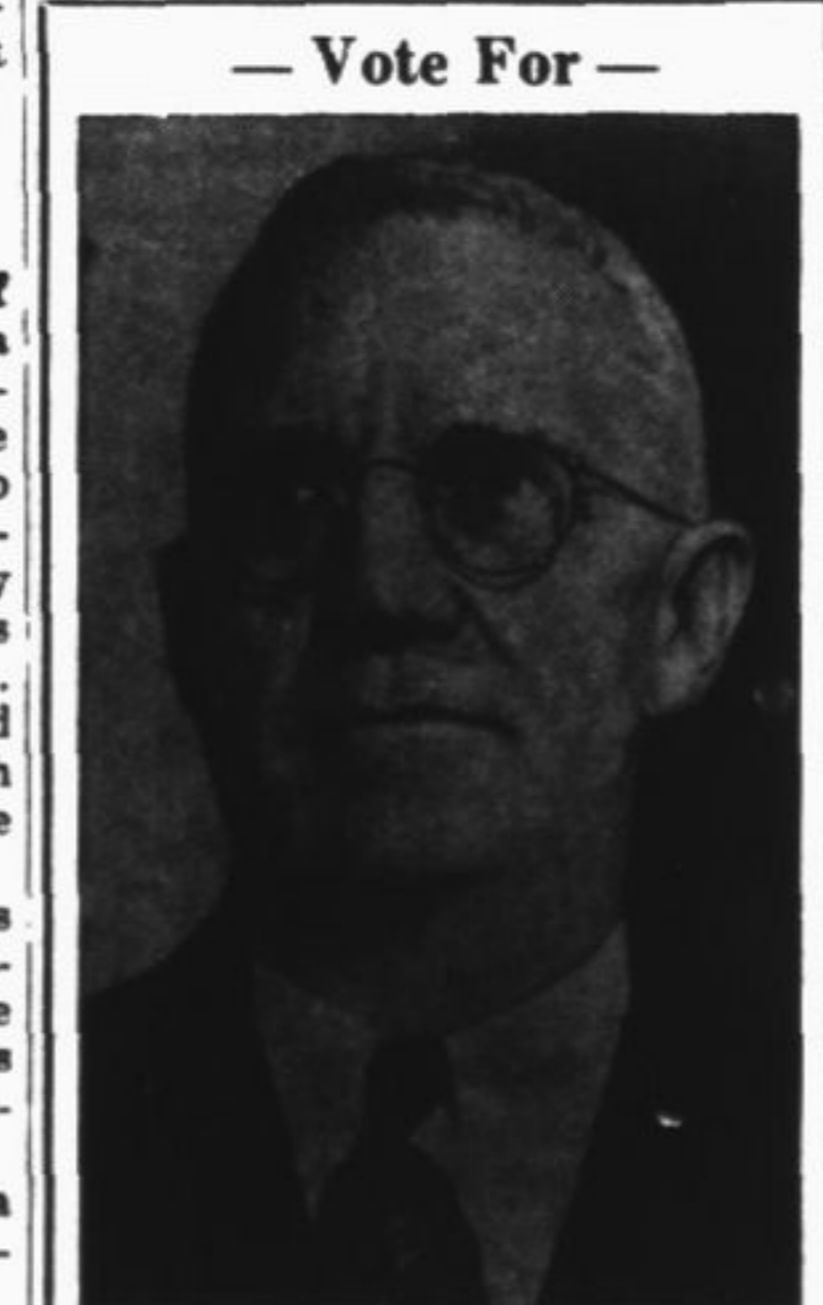
