The exterior is to be made of Williamsburg red brick and clapboard. As one enters the reception hall there is a wide deep archway leading to the living room. The archway is paneled with doors, one to a closet and the other to the two-car garage. Also leading from the hall is a doorway to a library with a large bay window reaching to the floor. The kitchen is a very attractive room with sunny windows, beautifully planned workspace and a breakfast corner. Besides the door to the outside, to the dining room and the library, is a door to the laundry which is conveniently located on the first floor. In the laundry is the heating equipment and hot water heater. The heat will be gas fired winter air conditioning with the spare under the entire first floor used as a plenum chamber for the return air, thereby making the floors constantly warm and the whole house comfortable. The dining room and living room have French doors leading to a porch that overlooks the golf course. The living room stretches all across the back of the house with two large bays flanking the fireplace that is visible as the room is entered from the reception hall. The large flesh-colored mirror above the fireplace warmly reflects the charm of this sunny room. As one proceeds upstairs there is a door at the landing and this leads to a sturdy heavy beamed game room the full size of the two-car garage below. At the top of the stairs are four doors in an efficient hall, one to a bathroom, one to a linen closet, one to a guest chamber and the other to the master chamber. The master chamber is a beautiful large room with windows on three sides, three good sized closets and a dressing table niche built in one of the dormer recesses. Announce Exams for Government Jobs The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations for the positions listed below. Applications must be on file in the Commission's office at Washington, D. C., not later than March 25 if received from States east of Colorado, and not later than March 28, 1940, if received from Colorado and States westward. Assistant mycologist (soils), \$2,600 a year, Bureau of Plant Industry, Department of Agriculture.
