Now, apparently, he wishes to make it appear that his party believes in the principles of the Hatch Act and last Wednesday delivered a speech with much emphasis in support of the proposed extension to it.

It is also an interesting fact that the Senator from Indiana (the Majority Whip), who has been opposing the legislation with equal vigor, is himself a candidate for reelection this year. He is an acknowledged political colleague of Paul V. Mc-Nutt, who, as Governor of Indiana. established the now favous "2% 'clubs" and a State political machine.
