League to Question Candidates Regarding Mothers' Pension Act

"What is your attitude toward the proposal that the provisions of the Mothers' Pension Act be made to conform with the Aid to Dependent Children provisions of the federal Social Security Act?" asks the Illinois League of Women Voters in a questionnaire sent out today to candidates at the April Primary for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, it was announced by Mrs. George G. Bogert, president.

Interest in the plight of dependent children in Illinois, now in adequately cared for under the mothers' pensions, together with a desire to see the Illinois General Assembly bring Illinois within the scope of the aid to dependent children provisions of the Social Security, is manifest throughout the state is the consensus of reports received today at the Illinois League of Women Voters state office in Chicago.

For the past month a committee of state board members among whom are Mrs. Maurice A. Pollack and Mrs. Raymond S. Simons of Highland Park have been visiting with the fifty local leagues throughout Illinois to discuss with them plans for informing public opinion on the need for aid to dependent children.

Art Pier Ranks High in Exams at Purdue "U"

Art Pier, who was graduated from the Highland Park high school last year, placed at the top in the English, psychological, and mathematics placement examination at Purdue university. He also passed examinations that permit him to take advanced work in three subjects.

Where 100 is the highest percentile rank and 0 the lowest possible score, Art received an English placement percentile rank of 99, an American Council psychological percentile rank of 99, and an Iowa placement-mathematics training percentile rank of 100.

He also passed examinations that gave him advanced credit in mathematics (algebra and trigonometry) that permitted him to register in advanced freshman chemistry, and that admitted him to an advanced section in engineering drawing.

C.M.T.C. Enrollment Progressing Rapidly

Lt. Colonel Richmond T. Gibson, CMTC officer, Illinois Military area, reports that the enrollment of applicants for the Citizens' Military Training Camps this summer is progressing at an excellent rate. The quota for the State of Illinois is 2,205. The enrollment campaign opened on March 1st and up to March 15th there had been received at the Headquarters of the Illinois Military area 1,305 applications, thus the enrollment is more than 50 per cent complete.

A great many young men are going to be disappointed by failing to get their applications in promptly. Young men 17 to 24 years of age, of good character and sound physique are eligible to apply.
