College Nine Seeks Outfield Strength

As the Lake Forest college baseball team goes through its daily pace inside the gymnasium at the school, it becomes more apparent each day that Coach Ralph Jones' biggest problem will be finding suitable outfield strength. The next biggest worry will be the catching department, as Bob Petersen, regular receiver for the past two years, dropped from school at the close of the first semester.

The strong point of the squad at this early writing seems to be the infield which has a veteran returning at each position. George Roberts of Lake Bluff at first base, Bob McKenna of Big Bend, Wis., at second base, Ian Falconer of Lake Forest at short stop and Joe Gulyash of Racine, Wis., at third base form an experienced and sharp fielding quartet. All four, however, could stand improvement as hitters. Backing up the veterans will be "Jake" Dishinger of Mundelein, Tom Ramsey of Chicago, and George Serini of Brooklyn, N. Y., a new Illinois Collegiate conference ruling allows freshmen to play varsity spring sports.

Although the pitching staff has no veterans returning, one good look at Big Jim Borgenson, last year's freshman ace, is enough to relieve much of Jones' worries. The big right hander has something that is quite rare among college pitchers: a combination of poise and control. His blazing fast ball should claim many a strike-out victim this spring. Backing up the six-foot-three star from Racine will be two freshmen, Bernie Honan of Chicago's Tilden Tech High school and Lyle Johnson of Hebron. Honan is a southpaw and Johnson a right hander.

Chuck Becker, freshman catcher last year, will handle the varsity assignment this year and will have as a relief man, Del Firme, a freshman from Iron Mountain, Mich.

Nothing will be known about the prospective outfield until weather permits the team to train outdoors, although Bobby Patterson of Braidwood, freshman center-fielder in 1939, looms as a fine varsity prospect.

Retain the Trade Agreement Program Say League Women

A fier stating the case for the Trade Agreements Program was issued today by the National League of Women Voters for dissemination throughout the country.

Nineteen other national organizations are committed to the tenet which is the subject of the fier: "Keep the Trade Agreements Program." Represented were women's groups, agricultural, manufacturing, church, peace groups, and a trade union group.

"What is at stake?" queried Mrs. Louise Leonard Wright of Chicago, the League's National Chairman of Government and Foreign Policy. "Nothing less than a vindication of a scientific method of tariff-making. Nothing less than faith in a democracy's ability to unite its people for national ends. Nothing less than the success of a practical effort to remove a fruitful cause of war in the world."

Three principal lines of argument are advanced — that the Trade Agreements Program should be kept (1) to promote national prosperity, (2) to promote scientific tariff-making, (3) to promote world peace.

On the prosperity front, the statement is that year after year prosperity is threatened with surpluses of farm and factory. Two ways have been employed by the federal government to solve the problem of the surpluses; reciprocal trade agreements to increase foreign markets, and controlled production and marketing. We quote:

"If new markets cannot be found for United States surpluses the number and variety of government restrictions on private production will probably increase."

"Foreign trade not only benefits producers whose goods are exported, but it improves domestic markets."

"National prosperity and foreign trade go hand in hand, and both have increased since the Trade Agreements Program was initiated. Since 1934 both foreign trade and the national income have increased by about one-fourth."

The Tariff Act of 1930 is used as an illustration of the illogical and wasteful process of unscientific tariff-making. This Act represented a year and a half of work by Congress, with 3,300 products involved, several hundred witnesses heard, proceedings filling 22 volumes, and in the end a reluctant signature from President Hoover who said, "a more scientific and business-like method of tariff revision must be devised."

"For the first time in the history of the United States," the fier comments, "a method of scientifically adjusting tariffs has proved successful. The Trade Agreements Program eliminates 'log-rolling' and minimizes vicious lobbying by special interests, in order that the general national interest may prevail."

As to world peace, the reasoning is that the raising of tariff walls causes nations to extend boundaries to get materials and markets. The fier concludes: "In a warring world, the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Program should continue to operate in order to promote peaceful economic relations wherever possible. When wars abroad end, the Program should be ready to contribute to the rehabilitation of sane trade relations among all nations as a foundation for enduring peace."
