Return Verdict of Accidental Death In Skokie Crash

Saturday morning a coroner's jury in an inquest held at the Highland Park city hall into the Feb. 6 auto death of Alice Jonaitis, 21, of 725 Jackson street, Waukegan, on Skokie road, Highland Park, returned a verdict of accidental death. Charles Vilhauer, 40, of Batavia, Wis., driver of the truck which collided with the Jonaitis car, was exonerated of blame after he had told his story.

Vilhauer testified he was driving his huge vehicle south on Skokie road, about 200 feet north of County Line road, when a northbound auto cut across the parkway into the path of his truck.

Miss Jonaitis died of injuries enroute to the Highland Park hospital. Her cousin, Lucille Jonaitis, 17, of 1111 Victoria street, North Chicago, and two soldier companions from Fort Sheridan, Edward Anderski, 22, the driver, and Andrew Desovich, 19, were seriously hurt.
