

High School Music Departments Will Go to State Meets

Highland Park High School band journeyed to Waukegan Township high school Saturday to compete in the district band tournament. Material Bids Are Opened Monday by Highwood Council

At an adjourned meeting of the Highwood City Council held Monday evening, bids on material for the new Railroad avenue improvement were opened. As the bids have not been tabulated, contracts will not be let until the April 5th meeting.

Gus Gaggioli was appointed superintendent of the work of widening and improving this stretch, which is from Highwood avenue to Prairie avenue. This stretch in Railroad avenue to Highwood avenue is much too narrow, and the widening will be a most welcome improvement to motorists. The street is to be widened to 31 ft. 7 in. and work will begin as soon as weather permits.

Crossing Watchman at Central Avenue Passes on Sunday

Joseph Leesch, 61, who for many years had been gateman at the Central avenue crossing of the North Western railroad, died Sunday morning at a Waukegan hospital, following a brief illness.

Leesch became critically ill last Wednesday evening, just as the "400" sped southward toward Chicago. Forgetting his excruciating pain and faintness when the warn-

ing bell rang in his shanty, he lowered the gates. After the train sped by, impatient motorists waiting at the crossing tried in vain to attract the gateman's attention in an effort to have the gates raised. Passerby investigated and found Leesch unconscious in his shanty. At the Waukegan hospital, it was said he had malignant ulcers. He died Sunday.

Funeral services were held yesterday (Wednesday) morning at 9:30 o'clock in St. James church, Highwood. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery, Wilmette.
