ever, work on the project is being carried on with the assumption that this will not be necessary.  
In an interview on Monday Commissioner Sharp stated that his department was preparing educational literature pertaining to the correct handling of refuse by the citizens of the community. To date refuse preparation, transportation and disposal has been carried on upon a more or less willy nilly basis with little or no regard for the economics of the problems involved. For the sake of economy and efficiency the department is going to attempt to educate the public in the proper way to prepare its refuse so that it can be handled with the least waste possible.  
Commissioner Sharp stated that promiscuous dumping of refuse both at the dump and surrounding territory was definitely going to be stopped even if resort to law enforcement had to be employed to accomplish this end. Starting with this week-end an employee will be stationed at the incinerator on Saturday afternoons and Sundays to direct proper garbage disposal by the public. All ashes and other non-combustible refuse must be taken to the Meyer dump.  
As another item of news in his department Commissioner Sharp announced that Arthur Anderson & Co., the well known firm of accountants, had been employed to audit the books of all city departments.  
Mayor Ronan stated he was in receipt of a communication from the organization originally sponsored by Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia of New York urging the various municipalities throughout the country to get behind and support a National Clean Up month. The purpose of this campaign is to stimulate the sale of paints, varnishes

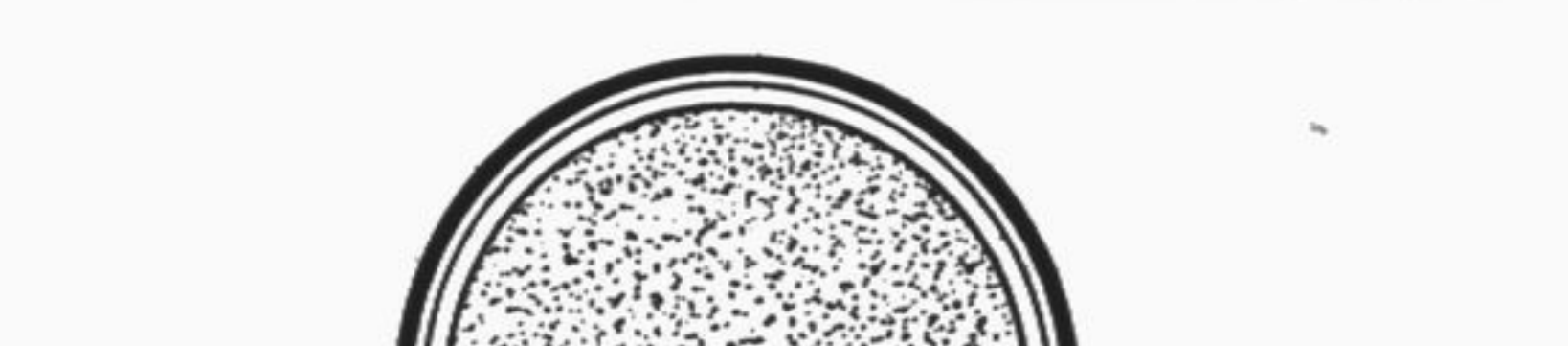
and other materials used in this type of work and to help solve the re-employment problem. Along this general line of thought the Mayor stated the city was contemplating reviving Clean Up Day. Some day later in the month a day will be set aside for the residents of Highland Park to clean out their attics and basements of unwanted odds and ends. If placed on the parkways the city will collect all discarded materials and haul them out to the city dump.  
The City Council will convene again in regular session on next Monday evening.
