Dr. Leon Doane Dies Suddenly Thursday; Buried in the East

Dr. Leon L. Doane, aged 82, who made his home with his daughter, Mrs. W. H. Blessing, 1008 Ridgewood drive, died suddenly last Thursday afternoon.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Kelley's chapel on N. Sheridan road. Interment was in Meadville, Pa.

Besides his daughter, Mr. Doane is survived by a son, Foster B. Doane of Wilmette.

The deceased, a retired physician, was an ardent scholar, who derived many hours of pleasure from poetry and German literature. He composed many poems, the most recent of which was a tribute to his elder brother, who passed away a short while ago.

Early last Thursday morning, Mr. Doane called at this office (The Highland Park Press) and dictated the following poem to one of the members of the Press staff, for publication in an early edition of the paper. The poem, which is called "The Lilies," was read by Rev. Christoph Keller at Mr. Doane's funeral services Saturday afternoon.

THE LILIES

"Consider the lilies how they grow"
In wooded dell and meadows low
Their curv'd petals of purest white
Are fashioned in the deeps of summer's night.

And when morning breaks over mead and fen
These gifts of God to the children of men
Unfurl their pinions of snowy white,

The meadow's green and heaven's blue,
And the delicate shades of violet light,

Exonerate Girl of Blame in Death of Marco Lotti

Catherine Croke, 26, last Friday was exonerated of all blame in the death of Marco Lotti, 52, who died of injuries suffered March 2 when he stepped into the path of Miss Croke's car.

A coroner's jury, called in the inquest at Seguin and Logan funeral home, found that Lotti died of head injuries resulting from the accident and that Miss Croke was in no way to blame.

Two Highway policemen, Walter Henderson and John Crovetti, testified that Lotti was conscious when they arrived and that he told them he did not see the car, which Miss Croke was driving, until it was upon him.

Charles Dean, a witness to the accident, said he saw Lotti cross the street in the middle of the block near 412 Waukegan avenue, Highwood, and saw him fall only to one knee when hit by the car. A pop bottle Lotti was carrying flew out of his hand and struck the car's windshield.

Dr. William L. Winter, who attended Lotti at the Highland Park hospital before his removal to the Lake county hospital, also testified.

Membership Is Rapidly Growing

Membership of the American Legion Auxiliary was rapidly approaching the 1940 goal of one-half million as the organization began its April activities, according to Mrs. Henry C. Eitner, the Auxiliary's local membership chairman. Nearly 460,000 members had enrolled up to April 1, approximately 25,000 more than on the same date last year. The 1938 membership of 482,348, the previous high record, is expected to be exceeded within a few weeks and the 500,000 mark reached early in the summer. The local unit's enrollment today is 82, compared with 55 at this time last year.

Aged Woman Hurt When Cars Collide
