

### Inklings from Neighboring Towns

Andrew Efinger, 75, a member of the Lake County Election Board suffered a stroke and died at his home in Waukegan, last Thursday morning.

Mr. Efinger was former farm manager of the Samuel Insull estate. He had lived in Waukegan for the past twenty-three years.

But for recent rains, permanent tracks of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee railroad company at both the north and south ends of the Winnetka grade separation would have been laid by this time.

Glencoe citizen: who several weeks ago were promised two new motion picture theaters are still looking elsewhere for their movie entertainment, patiently awaiting the beginning of even one cinema in their village.

Tentative plans have been filed by the Glencoe Theater corporation for their proposed theater on Vernon avenue, south of the Masonic temple at the southwest corner of Vernon and Hazel avenues, and by Sam C. Meyers for his residence house at the northeast corner of Scott and Linden avenues, but neither had filed workable drawings nor taken out building permits, up to Wednesday evening.

Mr. Meyers, however, the past week took out a permit to remove the Clarence C. Taylor residence from the site for his proposed theater, but that work is held up, pending the filing of a bond by the contractor, it was announced at the Glencoe village hall.

The Civilian Conservation corps completed the seventh year of its existence on April 5. Camp Skokie Valley, engaged in the Skokie drainage since 1933,

Southeast Wilmette will have a new North Shore line station on Linden avenue.

The Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railway has acquired the store on Linden avenue immediately west of the North Shore line right-of-way, and work was in progress this week to convert it into an adequate and comfortable station.

Acquisition of the building for the new station makes it possible to remove the small and unsightly station now occupied at the east of the right-of-way.

The new station will be complete with large waiting room, news and magazine stand and all other facilities commensurate with the needs and convenience of the traveling public. The new station also has the advantage of being located on the loop-bound side of the tracks.

It was announced by the railroad officials that the new station ticket office will be open 18 hours daily, from 6:30 a.m. to 12:30 a.m., the following morning.

Pre-season activity at Wilmette harbor began, last week, when Steward Tom Carney began to place the mooring buoys which will accommodate the boats this year.

Applications were sent out on March 1 to all boat owners who rented moorings last year and the deadline was April 1. All the moorings for this year have already been assigned, it was announced.

It is expected that most of the boats will slide into the water by May 1. The Sheridan Shore Yacht club's tune-up race has been set for May 25.

Construction of a 100-foot dingy-dock along the entire length of the new parking lot just east of the club house was announced. Tom Ward will supervise the construction of the dock, the cost of which is being financed by the Wilmette Harbor association.

### Highwood Going Into Movie Filming

An entertaining and amusing story will be built into a scenario. The cast will be chosen from local people, and all scenes will be of Highwood and vicinity, including parks, schools, churches, and representative business places.

A professional cameraman and director from the John B. Rogers Producing company will take charge of the production, and casting of characters will begin very soon.

Otto F. Fisher, president of the Highwood Lions club, is the general chairman in charge of the movie, and is being assisted by John DeSmidt, and Victor Benvenuti.

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### Tuberculosis Test For High School Pupils

Nearly 90 per cent of Highland Park high school students will take the tuberculosis test next week. A check of the cards sent out to parents and turned in by students shows that in most sessions only one or two students will not take the test.
