Celebrates Fifteenth Anniversary with Institute, April 25

The Association for Family Living is celebrating its fifteenth anniversary this month. In honor of this occasion, it is bringing to Chicago Mary R. Beard, author of "America Through Women's Eyes," co-author of "The Rise of American Civilization" and "America in Midpassage," who will present a one day institute to its members and friends to be held at the Standard Club on April 25th.

Because of Mary Ritter Beard's interest in interpreting the part which women have played in history and because she believes in the ability of mankind to learn from past errors, her subject, "The American Family in Midpassage," should be stimulating and challenging to her Chicago audience. This will be the only occasion on which Miss Beard will appear during her stay in Chicago.

The morning session opens at 10:30 a.m. with luncheon session at 12:45 p.m. Lillian Gish, star of "Life With Father," will speak at the luncheon. The afternoon session will convene at 2:15 p.m.

The Association for Family Living had its beginning in Chicago over twenty years ago in groups of mothers organized for informal study. Later nationally known experts who were brought in for public conference stimulated so much interest that the Chicago Association for Child Study and Parent Education was established in 1925 by Mrs. S. T. Lawton "to co-ordinate the efforts of organized child study groups and promote the idea of parent education." As such it became famous for its excellent conferences, its discriminating body of material available for parents and the soundness of its approach. As the demand for leadership began to come in from other groups, professional staff members were employed and the staff has grown throughout the last six years, in answer to the increasing demand, from two part time workers to a well balanced staff of eight trained persons under the direction of Evelyn Mills Duvall, executive director, and Dr. Irene M. Josselyn, psychiatrist.

In an attempt to interpret its growing emphasis on the whole family, and on youth as well as parent education and to authorize its enlarging program geographically, the Chicago Association for Child Study and Parent Education changed its name in the spring of 1939 to the Association for Family Living.

probably be requested by the city sometime during the first week in May and that actual construction would be started early in June to insure completion of the work by fall.

In an interview on Monday evening, Mayor Ronan stated that one of the more serious problems facing both the Plat Commission and the council was the growing tendency on the part of some Highland Park property owners to subdivide their property to the point where it was proving a serious detriment to the beauty of the city. Although these property owners were strictly within their legal rights their actions in cutting up their parcels of land were proving hardly conducive to the welfare of the respective neighborhoods involved. The mayor cited cases where two and sometimes three homes were being built on plots that previously held only one house. Inasmuch as many of the adjacent homes were centered on spacious areas of ground this action led to a rather incongruous effect when the neighborhood was viewed as a whole. As the procedure is entirely a legal one nothing much can be done except appeal to the property owner's civic pride. However, when civic pride and cash benefits clash, the former usually comes out second best.
