10 Lesson Course In Economics Opens "Y" Next Monday

A 10-lesson course in fundamental economics and social philosophy, under the auspices of the Henry George School of Social Science, opened Monday evening, April 15 at o'clock in the Highland Park Y.W.C.A., 374 Laurel avenue. will continue once a week for 10

Henry P. T. Tideman, Lake Forest, is the instructor. In his leadership of the class, Mr. Tideman will follow the discussion method throughout without requiring Jackrabbits written work nor examinations.

"This is a laboratory course in economics," he said, "in which basic economic principles are tested in relation to current problems."

The course is offered without tuition fee or other charge, the school being sustained by the donated services of its instructors and the voluntary contributions of its alumni. 'The reason the teachers of these classes give their services without financial remuneration," Mr. Tideman explained, "is because they believe that there can be no satisfactory ultimate solution of our economic and social problems without a more widespread study and restudy of economic principles.


